

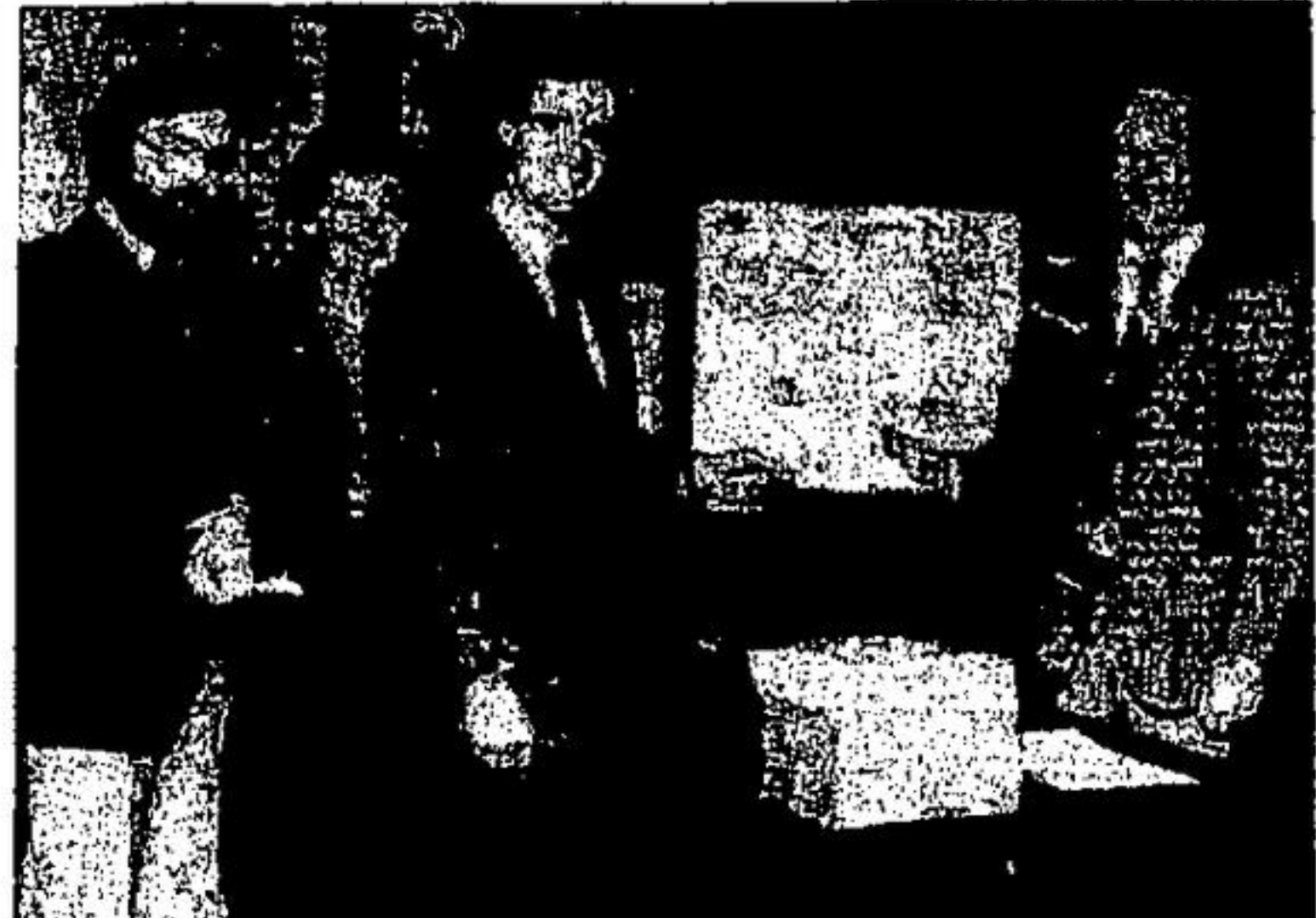
Ospringle
