# Raiders off to Timmins

Georgetown Chrysler Raiders left last night, (Tuesday) for the Eastern Canadian Intermediate championships in Timmins.

This will be a surprise to many fans since it was announced following Saturday's home game that the tourney was off. At the time it was off.

Timmins has been planning this event for about a year but last week there were rumblings it might be cancelled.

Saturday at noon the CAHA announced the

event was off because Timmins couldn't come up with a \$55,000 bank note.

New plans were rushed through. Georgetown was to host Northern Ontario champions Kirkland Lake Blue Devils in a best two out of three series to determine the all Ontario champs. Those games were to be played last night (Tuesday) tonight (Wednesday) and Thursday if necessary.

Meanwhile down east, Moncton, New Brunswick, the champs of Prince Edward Island and the best from

Newfoundland would meet to determine a Maritime's champion.

Then Ontario's top squad would travel to Moncton for a best three out of five games playoff beginning Friday in Moncton.

Raider general manager Jack Handy announced Timmins worked out its problems and late Sunday night the tourney again got the green light.

The six teams at the Timmins event, Raiders, Kirkland Lake, Moncton, PEI, Newfoundland and host Timmins are broken

into two groups for a round-robin. Georgetown is in with Timmins and PEI while Kirkland Lake, Newfoundland and Moncton are in the other group. The bottom teams from each group is then eliminated with the four survivors meeting in semi-finals on Saturday. The finals are set for 2 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

Raiders will face tough competition from Moncton as well as Kirkland Lake. Both are strong teams. The other teams are mysteries but judging from the past aren't likely to be that tough.

# Raiders OHA champ

We're number one! Georgetown Chrysler Raiders captured their fifth OHA Intermediate "A" championship in this decade Saturday before a packed crowd at Alcott arena. It was Georgetown's second championship in the past three years. They also won three years in a row in the early 70s.

finished third in the regular season and then upset Dundas Merchants, the defending champs and second place south division entry, four

games to three. Raiders victory over Thorold permitted them to capture the south division crown and Patterson trophy.
