The recent articles regarding support for social services in North Halton provide a shocking example of a negative vicious circle.

There seems to be ample indication that this area is in need of an accessible, full-time, competent counselling agency supported by municicipal funds. Yet it appears that the very population that needs a socio-economic

boost is unable to acquire it. We are not living in an age in which social awareness is just beginning to dawn; however, our regional backwardness creates an unnecessary culture shock for many residents who experience all the problems of modern times but are without modern resources to maintain a healthy balance.

Having been a professional in the behaviour consulting field for many years, I can assure the region that the paltry sums offered for a shoestring social agency in our area are very unlikely to attract competent and effective professionals or to establish any credible setting for the delivery of ser-

The token response to social and psychological needs is sufficiently unenlightened that it may encourage some people to think that the issue is unimportant! I do not hear of many residents volcing their concern but this does not indicate that everything is rosy. Could it be that a feeling of helplessness and powerlessness to influence government decisions has already set

This, in itself, would be a clear indicotor of the kind of behaviour that I assume is not on the list of criteria for healthy development of our region.

It would be most unfortunate if our social planning were to rest solely or ultimately only in the hands of people whose main expertise lies in the distribution of funds rather than in the appropriate application of resources to meet non-fiscal human values and needs.

At the moment, it looks as if the post industrial era is a little slow in coming to North Halton.


