\$4350 raised by Acton heart fund

Acton heart fund canvassers have, once again, surpassed their campaign goal, this year, by over \$300.

Canvassers were out knocking on doors in February, with their sights set at \$4,000, \$400 more than they raised last year. However, by the end of the campaign, they had raised \$4350, in addition to the \$2100 they received from In Memoriam from January to April.

A break down of the donations during the special month is: \$3036

from residential canvass: \$517 from commercial section; \$275 from industrial section; \$245 from the voluntary sale of roses; \$127 from the rural area; and \$150 returned from headquarters in Toronto.

Unfortunate if planning left to fund dispensers

Dear Editor:

The recent articles regarding support for social services in North Halton provide a shocking example of a negative vicious circle.

There seems to be ample indication that this area is in need of an accessible, full-time, competent counselling agency supported by municipal funds. Yet it appears that the very population that needs a socio-economic boost is unable to acquire it.

We are not living in an age in which social awareness is just beginning to dawn; however, our regional backwardness creates an unnecessary culture shock for many residents who experience all the problems of modern times but are without modern resources to maintain a healthy balance.

Having been a professional in the behaviour consulting field for many years, I can assure the region that the paltry sums offered for a shoestring social agency in our area are very unlikely to attract competent and effective professionals or to establish any credible setting for the delivery of services.

The token response to social and psychological needs is sufficiently unenlightened that it may encourage some people to think that the issue is unimportant! I do not hear of many residents voicing their concern but this does not indicate that everything is rosy. Could it be that a feeling of helplessness and powerlessness to influence government decisions has already set in?

This, in itself, would be a clear indicator of the kind of behaviour that I assume is not on the list of criteria for healthy development of our region.

It would be most unfortunate if our social planning were to rest solely or ultimately only in the hands of people whose main expertise lies in the distribution of funds rather than in the appropriate application of resources to meet non-fiscal human values and needs.

At the moment, it looks as if the post industrial era is a little slow in coming to North Halton.
