Track squad prepares for season

Acton High School's track team has shifted into high gear in preparation for the upcoming track and field season which will begin May 8.

The local track team was at two meets over the past week with some very respectable finishes. At the Rebel Relays, which were held at Oakville's Sheridan College, the Acton senior girls ran off with top honors in both the four by

100 metre and four by 200 metre. At the Forest City Preparation Meet in London at the University of Western Ontario Meridith McLaren paced Acton with first place and new meet records in the Senior Girls' 100 metre hurdles and open 3000 metre hurdles.

Other top performances at the Forest City Meet included a fifth place finish in the senior boys 200 metres. At the Rebel relays

Teams are expected from all over Ontario for the event. On Tuesday May 8 the Acton High team will compete at the Halton County track and field meet at Oakville's Sheridan College and on the Friday, May 12 they will switch to Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium for the County finals.

they've got too many friends in high places. "We in the NDP are willing to act on behalf of the little guy to curb monopoly power and let him compete.

"I don't mean just the corner store, but the small manufacturer and the small laborer. There's no conflict there. There need not be because of the common enemy... the stranglehold the multinationals have over our economy.

"We believe a strong central government is necessary in economic matters. Economic problems, Blakeney aside, cannot be solved by the provinces. They don't have the resources.

"In social and cultural matters, decentralization is good. The diversity of culture is best preserved by decentralization of social services. I don't think you'll find many premiers who disagree.

"The problems of this country are beyond the 'people' stage. Replacing Pierre Trudeau with Joe Clark is not going to make a difference. The problems will still be there.

leader, Mr. Clark. Mr. Jelinek admitted he supported Claude Wagner in the 1976 leadership convention in Ottawa, but says he has been pleasantly surprised with Clark.

"I was concerned because our party was fragmented and I didn't think it could be united under Clark. Well, he has united our party. He has created a team.

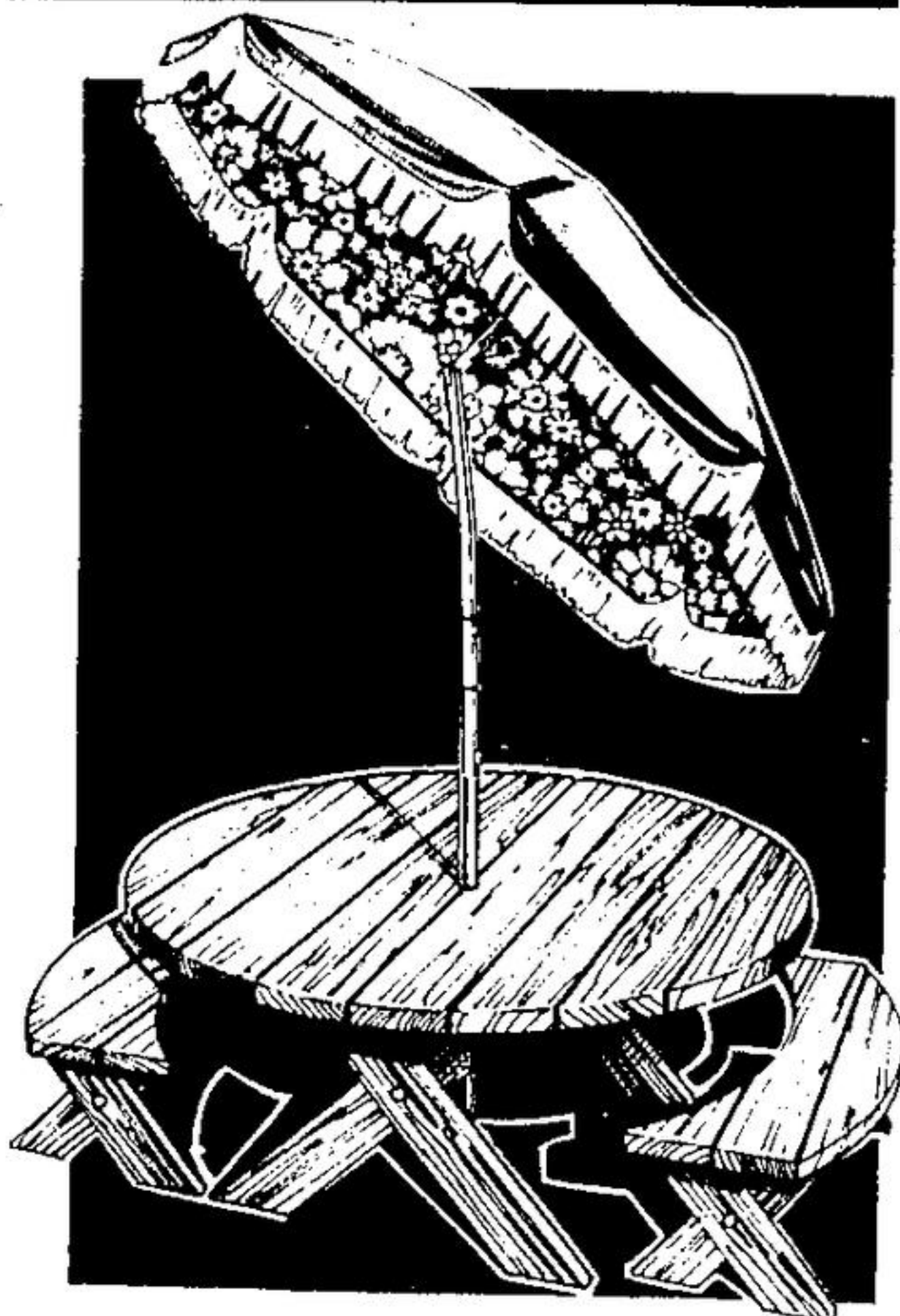
