Six new faces on Board

Six new members were elected to the nine member board of directors of Halton Hills Community Legal Clinic Wednesday night, at the annual public meeting.

Three sitting members re-elected were John Bew, Peter Oprica, and Rev. Peter Barrow. New members Rod Kruger, Renata Euteneier, Bill Phipps, Dave Evans, Kathy Jarvis and Gord Chapman also make up the board. Rev. Barrow, chairman for the previous year, reported 520 cases were handled last year by the clinic.

He reported seminars on various legal topics were held for the public throughout the year, and explained the community legal worker in addition to her work within the

clinic goes out to explain the function of the clinic to various groups, and takes part to a limited extent, in community outreach activities. Barrow said through the course of the year the case load dropped so one legal worker was let go. "He did a good job while he was here," commented Barrow. The chairman said the standards of legal clinics in Ontario were maintained, and budget set, which was approved by the Ontario Legal Aid Plan. He explained a part time lawyer would be hired to be shared with the Mississauga clinic. The services of lawyers for clinics was advocated in the Grange report, he added.

Terry Baines, a lawyer, said he wondered if the clinic is duplicating services already in existence, and pointed out Unemployment Insurance questions, and workmen's Compensation questions could be handled by the MP and MPP constituency offices paid through taxpayers' money.

Community legal worker Peggie Balkind said many of the people come to the clinic after receiving no satisfaction there.

Baines explained he was not talking about litigation but simply delays and bungling problems.

Peter Oprica pointed out some people don't have transportation to these offices. Bill Henderson asked why duty counsel (lawyers working a few hours a week on a rotating basis) had been discontinued in favour of hiring one part-time lawyer.

Barrow replied continually was one of the reasons, since people prefer to deal with the same lawyer if they have to come more than once. Johan McMillan, lawyer and member of the previous year's board of directors, stated, "The Grange report indicated there would be no funding unless there is a lawyer, partly because of insurance, and OLAP has accepted that report."

Drawings available to estate planners

Eramosa council agreed to make Rockwood's water and sewer systems drawings available to Gamsby and Mannerlow, planners for the Dunbar Bros., owners of the former Strange-Price Estate.

A subdivision proposal for the approximately 70 acre Rockwood property, which extends along the

Eramosa River's southern shore through to Harris St., is based on two acre estate lots, retailing for over \$100,000, according to Deputy Reeve David Masson.

The project proposal involves utilizing the municipal water supply, with septic tank sewage systems.

Planning Board is looking at the increased assessments on such properties, reported Deputy Reeve Masson.

In fairness to Rockwood residents any subdivision must hook up or the impost fees must be high enough to compensate for monies lost, he said.
