Paul O'Brien is going to make sure the fine reputation and high quality of the Lovell Bros. Butchers is carried on.

Mr. O'Brien reopened the doors of Acton's only butcher shop April 20, after a six week closure following the death of co-owner Gord Lovell. The new owner plans to keep the Lovell name, and purchase all meat from the same suppliers. This way, he says, it ensures his customers are getting the same high quality they got with Len and Gord Lovell.

Mr. O'Brien is not new to the butcher business. Twenty years ago, when only 16, he started out, and within four years had his own business. He holds his meat manager's papers and has managed meat departments for Dominion, National Grocers and IGA stores. Before striking out on his own again, Mr. O'Brien was managing the meats at Bolton Supermarket.

As manager in Bolton, Mr. O'Brien heard about the sale of the Lovell business. He knew the store by its reputation in the trade and when he came to town to look it over was immediately impressed by its cleanliness, and the fact that the town still has a strong downtown core.

The new owner hopes to improve the produce end of the business and plans to do business with the Ontario Food Terminal.

Mr. O'Brien is pleased with the clientele who have stayed with the Lovell name. One fear Len had when he closed the place was that customers would change their shopping habits before the business could be reopened, but Mr. O'Brien does not think this has happened.

A family man, Mr. O'Brien is married with a son, 16, and a daughter, 12. He is a charter member of the Bolton Lions Club, and was a volunteer ambulance driver for 16 years. He and his family recently built a new home in Loretto, in the Hockley Hill.

Fraud trial remanded

After several false starts last week the trial of Robert Bilodeau, former director of a home in Hornby for the mentally handicapped charged with fraud, was remanded until June 20.

County court Judge Patrick LeSage ordered the remand after hearing arguments from defence lawyer Jack Bellegem that he had not been provided with material in the crown attorney's possession upon which to base the defence.

The nature of the material—bank records, pass books, and log

books—is "not neat, orderly and systematized", so summaries have been prepared, Judge LeSage said. But it was not a refusal to cooperate on the part of the crown, he said.

Bilodeau, 31, was charged last August for defrauding the mentally handicapped residents from October 1976 to December 1977, the period he was director of the home.

On Thursday court heard the names of the 16 residents he has been charged with defrauding of more than \$7,000.

The judge said in view of the complexity of the evidence, it would be most expeditious to

adjourn the trial and asked both crown and defence lawyers to do their utmost to see information is provided.

Bilodeau elected a non jury trial. No plea was entered.

Originally charged in August 1978, after an investigation by Halton police, Bilodeau's trial was to have begun last Tuesday. Because the judge was unable to make it, the trial was adjourned to Wednesday morning when counsel asked that it be set aside for a while. It was until 2:30 p.m., then put over until 9:30 a.m. Thursday. The trial got underway at 10:40 and was adjourned at noon to June 20.

Children playing with matches is listed as the cause of a grass fire at the rear of Fairview Cemetery around supper time Friday. People living nearby reported the fire. Grants lag behind cost: school bd.

Provincial grants fail to keep pace with Halton's Board of Education costs, according to an analysis released by board officials Thursday in Burlington.

"We are often asked to explain why local taxes go up when enrolment goes down," reports Education Director Em Lavender.

The net hike in local taxes from last year to this year due to enrolment is \$119,581, according to the analysis prepared by Lavender.

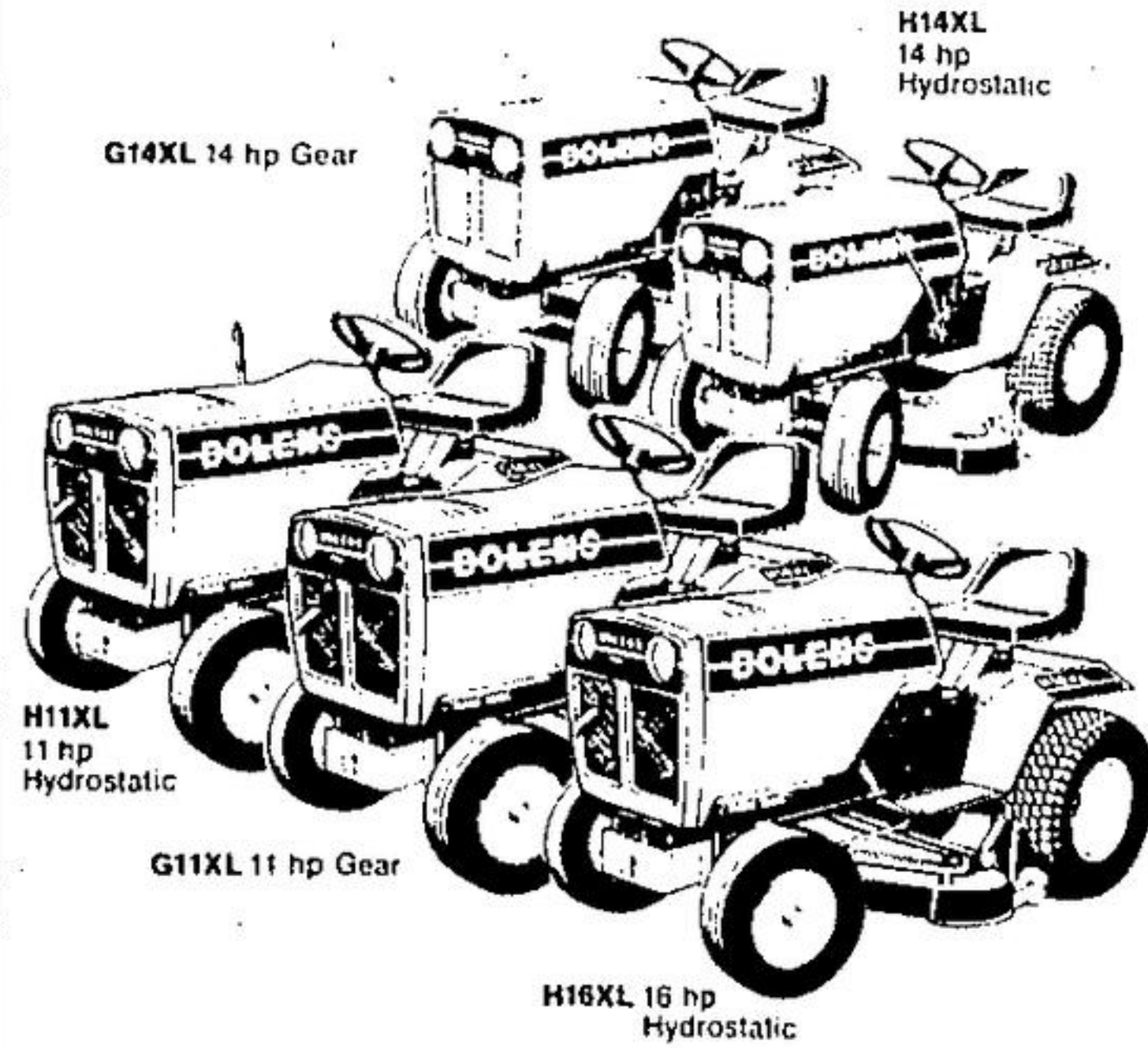
The report assumes a decrease in enrolment of 1,000 elementary pupils.

The \$119,581 figure represents the difference between the reduction in the grant, because of decreased enrolment and the lessening of the actual costs.
