Board awards painting deals

Brookville Public School will receive more than \$3,000 worth of improvements, since Halton Board of Education awarded tenders Thursday at Burlington. Other schools also will be improved materially.

Brookville's improvements include an inside and outside painting by

contractor A.C. Farlow and paving by Ruddock Paving Co. Ltd. Total cost is \$3,372.

Farlow will also be painting at these schools: Centennial, Glen Williams, Limehouse, Martin Street, Speyside and the high schools at Milton and Georgetown. Total value of the contracts is \$12,160.

Gil Vansoelen is painting J.M. Denyes, Park and Robert Baldwin schools for \$6,170.

Many schools in the board's east and west area are also scheduled for painting and paving.

Burlington trustee Bill Priestner said he is concerned with what he called the lack of competitiveness with tenders in the north. On some jobs, he said, there was only one bid. The trustees urged the staff to beat the bushes for more bids next year.

Milton Ward three Ivan Armstrong said he wants the board to practise as

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No crosswalk slated for Mill

There will be no crosswalk on Mill St., near Frederick St.

Halton Hills General Committee Monday evening voted to accept the recommendation of Deputy Town Engineer Ted Ballinger not to install the crosswalk.

Mr. Ballinger had been instructed by council in February to look into the need for a walk at the Acton Medical Centre. Senior Citizens had complained to local councillor Ed Wood about the difficulty in crossing the street to get to the building.

The report noted there are currently three crosswalks in Acton, all installed prior to the inception of Regional government. Police have not had any complaints about the area, according to Mr. Ballinger.

The engineer's office

did an eight hour study of vehicular and pedestrian traffic in April and the department realized there was sufficient warrants to qualify for a crosswalk. However, the report continued, only 20 per cent of the pedestrians were senior citizens, while 24 per cent were children and 56 per cent, non senior citizen adults.

The department estimated the costs to be \$5000 for a pedestrian cross over, with \$500 yearly maintenance fee.

Instead, the department recommended that parking be prohibited on both sides of Mill St. within 30 metres east and west of the west side of Frederick St. The recommendation was passed unanimously by committee and now goes on to council for final approval.

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
