



Hearing aids

People whose ears don't work, listen with their eyes.
They look at your mouth, your hands, your face, to transfer sounds they don't understand into sights they do.
It takes a little time, just like it does when you have to translate a foreign word into English before you respond.

Please take that time to help.

When you're speaking with someone who reads lips:

- Make sure you have their attention before you speak.
 - Keep the light on your face.
 - Speak clearly, at a normal speed.
 - Don't exaggerate your lip movements.
 - Don't mumble or shout.
- Don't eat, chew, smoke or laugh while you're speaking.
- Rephrase your remarks if you're not being understood.
 - Don't hesitate to write your message down.

When you're speaking with someone who uses sign language:

- Be imaginative. Help explain with your hands.
 - Learn these few basic phrases.
