# Black happy in loss

By John Colliston NDP candidate Doug Black burst into his Oakville riding office full of optimism yesterday and remained in high spirits throughout the night, despite his third place finish in Halton riding.

Encouraged by good support of the NDP in the Maritimes earlier in the evening, Black had hoped the trend would continue in Halton. But early results showed Progressive Conservative candidate Otto Jelinek was clearly the winner.

However, Black remained in high spirits since it was evident the NDP would gain a substantial number of votes over the 1974 election.

After 272 of 274 polls had reported in, Jelinek

The crowd at the Galaxy Club on North Service Rd, seemed to share Black's high spirits since it appeared they expected the outcome.

Black's campaign manager Bob Del.eeuw said earlier in the evening he was satisfied with the results, since by 9.30 p.m. he had already collected 14.9 per cent of the vote.

"I didn't know how the vote would go," admitted Black. I've been through before, I'm relaxed because I'm pleased with the campaign."

Black has experienced political defeat before. He lost his attempt to gain a provincial seat in 1977.

Political observers throughout the two months of campaigning agreed that Black bad added a great deal of credibility to his party. He came out on top in many of the regional alleandidates' meetings.



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
