No resolution of issue from ice rate meeting

Thursday's ice rates meeting between groups using the town's arenas, recreation department officials and a special committee of council appears to have resulted in no solution to the

The meeting was held behind closed doors at Stewarttown Hall and everyone in attendance contacted by this newspaper is generally respecting the confidence of the meeting.

Sources report each of the 12 ice using groups in Halton Hills made presentations outlining the harmful effects of the huge ice rental rates increases approved by council in March will have on their group. Some criticisms of the often

maligned recreation department were also

Mayor Peter Pomeroy, Councillors Pat Patterson, Harry Levy, Ed Wood and Roy Booth are now expected to go back and examine the group's briefs before coming to another meeting with the rate proposal they are expected to recommend to council.

Speculation is that the rates won't be reduced, or reduced very little, but grants for minor hockey and figure skating will be substantially increased. Also the committee of council is expected to recommend dropping of the 10 per cent of the gate town take for groups using the rink, and charging admission on Fridays and Saturdays.


