McLaren third in hurdles qualifies for OFSAA

Acton High School's Meredith McLaren was the only local athlete to qualify for the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Association (OF-SAA) finals at the OF-SAA regional meet in St. Catharines last week.

Miss McLaren ran a personal best time of 15.7 seconds for the senior girls' 100 metre hurdles allowing her to finish third behind Brampton's Julie White and Mary Ann Ball of Dundas. Miss White's winning time was 14.9 seconds while Miss Ball ran the race in 15.1.

Other Acton competitors at the meet included long jumper John Lobello and pole vaulters Don Weaver, Ted Nadhazy and Larry Kurtz.

Lobello found trouble in locating the jumping board and wound out the competition with two faults and a wrong foot take-off. With the wrong

foot take-off jump being his only legal jump he finished in tenth spot. According to coach Lyn McLaren, a Lobello jump equal to Peel-Halton leap would have qualified him for OFSAA.
