Three village residents supported by a petition bearing 22 signatures, petitioned council to take

action regarding the unsightly property located at 37, Block D, Corner of Queen and Jackson Streets, Rockwood.
According to the document the present operation of uses on that site, is not listed in the zoning bylaw.

The approximate six foot high board fence surrounding the property does not allow clearance

of view 50 feet along Jackson St. and 50 feet along Queen St. and the view of traffic is obstructed it says.

Trucks, cars, heavy construction equipment, tires and lumber are stored on the lot, say the residents.
Nearby homeowners are concerned about their own property devaluation.

According to petitioner Grace Day Rockwood Village Trustees have already tried to deal with the problem with no results. The collection has been accumulating on the site for about two years, she said.
Council passed a resolution instructing the building official to start legal procedure to correct the situation.
