Booze charges laid

Brampton-Peel Regional Police topped off a two-month undercover investigation last week by laying the largest number of charges laid against a licensed establishment in the province during a single investigation. Some customers, the staff and owners of the Shield and Sword Motor Inn on Queen Street East Brampton face 623 charges related to liquor violations. The four owners each face 60 charges of selling booze to minors and 42 charges peddling liquor to intoxicated patrons. The manager faces the same charges as do seven staff members. Members of Peel Police morality bureau and divisional officers kept tabs on the goings on at the inn during March and April.
