Neighbors want action on drainage problem

Drainage from the property at 405 Main St. Rockwood, is causing problems and damage to the rear Wetherald St. properties, neighbours say. They want the problem corrected.

Ray and Davida Ingleson, Wetherald St. presented a petition to Eramosa township Council, Monday signed by 23 neighboring property owners, requesting council's action on the matter.

Recent construction of a two and one half car garage on the Main St. property, which sits higher than the Wetherald St. lots, has added to the already existing drainage problems, said Mr. Ingleson.

One and one half days after the garage foundation excavation, the hole filled with water which ran onto his property Mr. Ingleson said. He fears that back fill will be required with the garage development, and expects further problems. He suggested that a stop

work order be placed on the building and drainage problems be solved now.

The building meets township frontage and rear yard requirements, said Building Inspector John Salmon.

Councillor John McLeod recalled long-standing drainage problems in the area. He commented that grading on the whole development is wrong. Run off comes back from, rather than onto the highway, he

said.

Plumbing inspector Carl Meadows noted he had discussed the Ingleson problem with the township solicitor. He suggested that the Inglesons initiate civil action against the property owner.

Council advised Building Inspector Salmon to investigate the entire neighborhood drainage problems, with reference to the municipal drainage act.

\$83,000 spent on Rockmosa

To many Eramosa residents Rockmosa Park Playing Fields development may seem at a standstill, but up to date over \$83,000 has been poured into the project, according to Roads Superintendent Bob Hamilton.

Cox Construction donated \$75,000 worth of fill to the area—land deposited from their Hwy 7 reconstruction contract.

Costs of drilling and dynamiting rock behind the Community Centre, parking lot gravel and rough grading the playing fields totalled over \$8,000.

Wet weather has hampered development this spring, but rough grading is expected to be finished

within a few weeks, weather permitting, Mr. Hamilton said.

The next steps include stone picking, final cleanup, seeding and fertilizing. The fields should be ready for action next spring, he said.

Soccer and Baseball Clubs are expected to assist in the stone picking and seeding operations, according to the recreation committee.

Soccer goal posts, baseball backstop, diamond development, bleachers and flood lights will be installed as money comes available, said Mr. Hamilton. Funds for such equipment are not allocated in the 1979 recreation budget.

Thumbs down to sale

Eramosa township council voted down Rockwood Trustee's request to sell a 132 x 66 vacant residential lot at the corner of Dowler and Gowen Sts.

The two groups will further discuss the matter tonight (Wednesday).

Village Office and town hall hookup costs, frontage charges and town hall roof repairs face the trustees.

"Rather than burden the taxpayer, we decided to defray expenses by selling the lot," said trustee chairman Rick Lewis.

Councillor McLeod noted future parking problems may develop in the downtown commercial core. He questioned the lot's suitability for parking space development.

Fire Chief Carl Meadows said the lot, located beside the Rockwood Bicycle Shop, was purchased about 15 years ago for a fire hall.

Measures to correct the sanitation problems at the Teddy Bear Restaurant, Hwy 24 are underway. Plumbing Inspector Carl Meadows informed council.

Council annoyed

A letter from the Ministry of the Environment project engineer Allan Patterson answered some council questions regarding the Rockwood water and sewer project.

Final date for cash prepayment of water and sewer frontage charges has been extended to November 30, from July 31. Annual payment date for homeowners choosing the 40 year payment plan is also November 30, 1979.

A house-to-house

survey of residences requiring a basement pump will be conducted by consultants.

Consultants will meet with Roads Superintendent Bob Hamilton. Remedial measures necessary to correct last winter's frozen water main problems will be sorted out, the correspondence indicated.

The Minister of the Environment has not yet been directly informed of Rockwood's water and sewer system problems. Deputy Reeve David Masson and councillor John McLeod expressed annoyance. Reeve Bill Adsett should follow through with council's June 4 decision, they insisted.

Briefs

The Court of Revision will not reconvene. Rockwood water and sewer frontage charge disputes were dealt with May 16, council decided. Residents were notified of the court date three weeks in advance and had ample opportunity to file complaints, council noted.
