# Outdoor courses study Scriptures

Dear Sir, In order to emphasize the importance of children in this "Year of the Child", a special effort is being made to contact parents of public school-aged children through the churches. However some may miss the message, and I should like to use your column to reach these people.

Members of various churches who really love children and feel they are very important have given money so that meetings for children can be held this summer vacation. Meetings are held outdoors on lawns or in parkland with a teacher supplied, from July 30 to Aug. 3 in Acton.

Churches are being asked only to send the children. No cost is involved. Churches benefit from the classes for the pupils are strongly advised to go to church after the week-long classes are over. The pupils have a strong desire to read their Bibles after the course. They have a greater interest in the missionary effort of the church as well. Besides the increased attendance in the Sunday schools, the church itself benefits too, for often the parents follow their child into the church.

Parents can rest assured their child is well taught for all the teachers supplied are very well trained. They

are using well-researched materials which are attractive to children, and which teach the Bible lessons clearly. However, teachers avoid any mention of denominations and ask the child to attend the local churches near home, or their own parents' preference.

This vacation Bible class is called Five Day Club, and is under the sponsorship of the Ontario Child Evangelism Fellowship of Toronto. This is an inter-denominational group which has as its only interest the Christian faith and its personal acceptance by the pupils, to give the child an early knowledge of the peace of mind that is possible through a firm faith in Jesus Christ.

Now that explanation of the group has been given I trust that parents will take advantage of this gift towards the "Year of the Child". Our Lord Jesus Christ Himself frequently showed how important He felt that children are; we must follow in His path. May we not be too late! Encourage children to go. Visit the class yourself and enjoy the simplicity of this important Book. Watch for the advertisements. Perhaps you will want to continue the work this winter; Child Evangelism is very helpful.
