

Thieves break into Legion

Thieves looted some liquor bottles from the Royal Canadian Legion after they smashed their way through a window. The loot consisted of between eight and ten bottles of rye whiskey and about \$10 in small change. Thieves broke into the Wright Ave. building by smashing a window in a northside door.

The front door of the town office on Mill St. was smashed by a rock-throwing vandal. Damage to be paid by taxpayers is \$60.

Some food was consumed after thieves got inside Acton Bowling Lanes last week. They smashed a window on the second floor.

A Meadvale Rd. resident reported theft of a \$150 light fixture from his property last week. The outdoor fixture is described as a 14-inch French Ball.

Police suspect local youths in connection with a break-in at Mackenzie Bulldial on Church St. last week. The interior of the building was left a mess after vandals got inside the office. Entry was gained by working through one of the windows.

Vandals smashed \$150 worth of door window glass and stole some window screens from Limehouse school.

It's not known if anything was stolen, but someone got inside the Croation Voice Newspaper office on Mill St. W. The publisher discovered a window was ajar. Entry was gained sometime Sunday or Monday.

Two Acton youths were caught at Park Lincoln Mercury where they were trying to steal a machine. They were apprehended at the scene.

Some thief seems to have known where to go for loot. A Greenore Cr. woman reported to police the theft of \$150 in cash from her home sometime Friday or Saturday. Nothing else was disturbed.

During the first week of the month someone walked off with a gas grill, cart and gas tank from a Main St. N. address. Value of the equipment is about \$240.

As a result of a motor vehicle collision investigation on Highway 25 police caught suspects wanted for car theft at Shelburne.

Police are checking an instance of wilful damage at Holly Industries on Eastern Ave. last week. Vandals tore down part of a fence.




