## International gathering in Rockwood Saturday

Rockmosa Community Centre buzzed with activity Saturday as 54 international students arrived to meet district Lions' Club families—their vacation hosts for

the next four weeks. The students travelling from countries as far away as Japan, Sweden and Denmark are part of the Lions' Youth Exchange Program. Rockwood was the meeting place. From here stu-

dents fanned out to Lions' homes throughout Southern Ontario. Local Lions provided introductions and distinctive T-shirts for the visitors.

The youth spend the first and latter vacation weeks with the host families.

The second week the students camp together in St. Marys, Ontario, at the Lions' Wildwood Youth Camp—the only international camp in Canada, according to organizer Dorothy Campbell of Orangeville. The program began in Canada five years ago—its purpose to better international relations. Lasting friendships develop among the students, host families and camp youth, said Mrs. Campbell. About 25 Canadian students are visiting Lion families in other countries this summer, she added.

Students are chosen by local Lions Clubs and families apply to be their hosts. This program is active throughout Canada and the USA. Lions' Districts A-15 and A9 sponsored the southern Ontario Youth exchange.
