Eramosa Baha'is celebrate events

The Baha'i Community of Eramosa celebrated an event in modern religious history Monday—the martyrdom of the Bab.

The Bab ("The Gate") founded the Babi Faith in Iran in 1844 and was the forerunner and herald of Baha'u'llah ("The Glory of God"), who founded the Baha'i Faith in 1863.

Baha'is believe that the coming of the Bab and Baha'u'llah fulfilled prophecies in the Old and New Testament and the Koran concerning the establishment of God's kingdom on earth.

The Bab was shot in 1850 at the age of 31, in Tabriz, Iran, six years after his ministry began. His execution was ordered by Persian civil and ecclesiastic leaders who feared the fast growing religion which spread rapidly across Iran during the 1840s.

Baha'is in more than 300 countries around the world now celebrate the martyrdom of the Bab and eleven other holy days each year.

Women's Place has new home in Milton

The Milton Police Station is going to become Halton Women's Place.

Halton Regional Council approved Wednesday, July 4, a motion leasing it to the women's group effective in October.

Halton Women's Place is a volunteer incorporated association formed in 1977-78 to examine the possibility of setting up an emergency shelter. It will make use of support systems such as social services,

Children's Aid and the police. Regional council gave staff approval to proceed with the drawing up of costs and the integration of an emergency shelter with its social services department.

The motion was put forward by the finance and administration committee.

It said, "That the premises known as 48 Hugh St. (the police station), be leased to Halton Women's Place for one year commencing in October, 1979, for \$1 subject to the payment of the total purchase price which will be determined at a later date prior to the end of the term of the lease."

The motion also authorized staff to prepare reports pertaining to per diem fees for service, integration of services and day care as well as the separation of the lot which is part of the regional land parcel.

The building would be used as an emergency shelter for abused women and their dependent children.
