Rockwood keyboard instrumentalist and vocalist Michael Dragoman was the heart of the evening's production. He arranged the musical scores, organized and emceed the show.

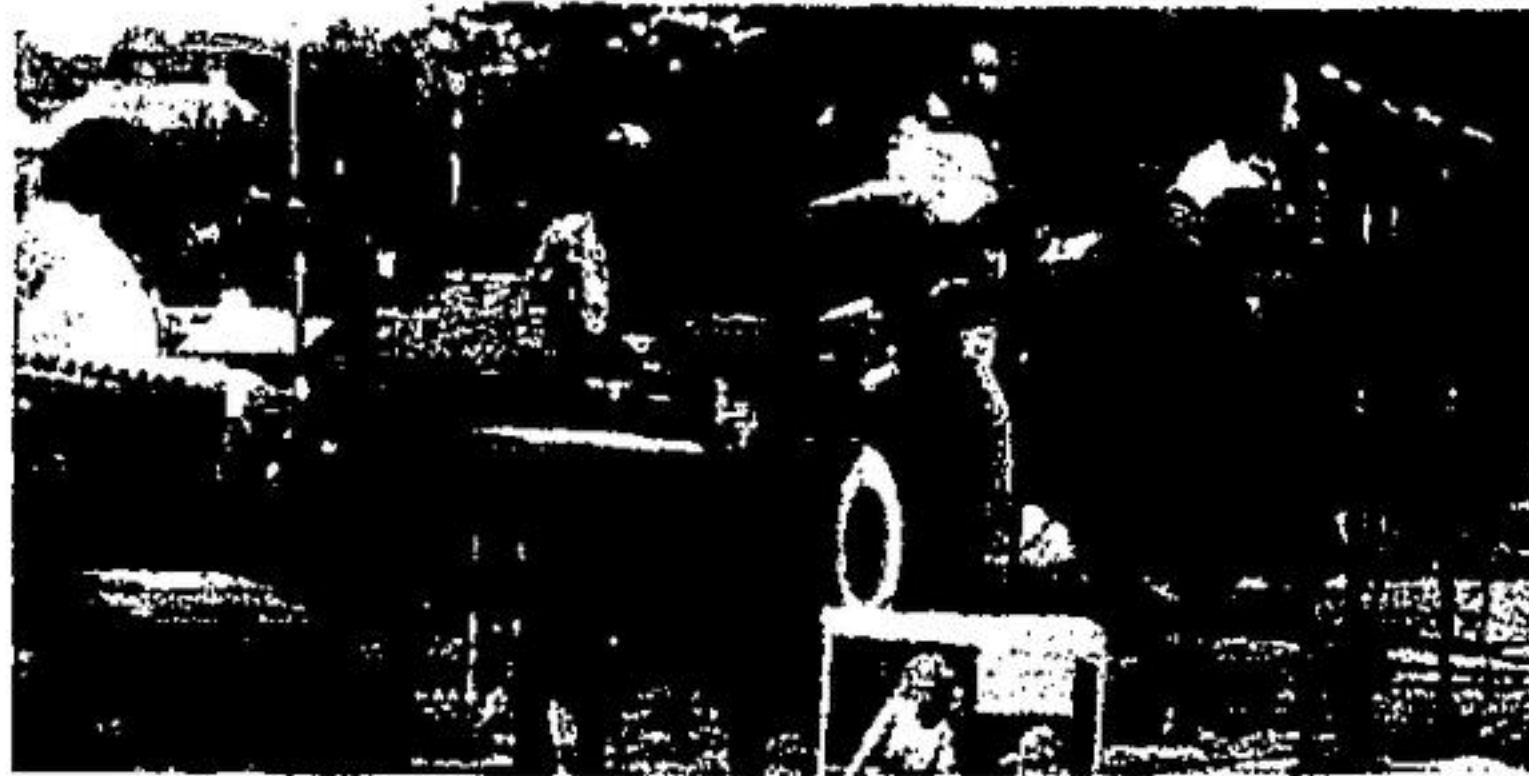
