Farm family income rose more than non-farm family income between 1971 and 1975. The increase was the result of better farm revenues rather than more offfarm work.

The income gap between urban and farm families was reduced over the five years. In 1971, en average farm family carned only 70 per cent as much as an urban family of the same size. But by 1975 the propartion had increased to 93 per cent. In 1975, a tarm family earned about \$13,100 while an urban family earned about \$14,100 in net in-

These findings are part of a recently released report on farm family incomes, prepared by Agriculture Canada's Policy, Planning and Economics Branch. It provides detailed income information for 1975 and is the third in a series of


