## CVCA sees study as more delay in problem

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority executive was not too pleased to discover Halton Region has commissioned a \$12,000 study of the leachate problem at Georgetown landfill site, seeing it as more delay.

Chairman Grant Clarkson said the last time regional staff was at the CVCA they said they were going to start work immediately to remedy the problem. "That was a couple of months ago." Clarkson pointed out the CVCA had intended to put a stop work on the landfill site because of pollution of the Credit River but held off when they were told the situation would be remedied. "If we continue to allow pollution of the river we are derelict in our duty," commented the chairman.

Board member Gail Malby said the two month period for the study by Gartner Lee Associates is excessive.

Engineer George Popadopolous said he was concerned about the length of time also and said he would like a letter sent to the region seeking re-assurance the work would be carried out this year.

CVCA member Ken Whillans suggested a motion saying the continued operation of the landfill site is a violation of regulations, but found no support.

CVCA manager Glen Schnarr admitted the region was taking a long time, but contended the study should show the correct answer, rather than proceeding immediately with work which may not be a solution.

The CVCA staff will present a report in two weeks' time, and will send a letter to Halton Public Works department urging completion of the work this year.

R. Maurer of the regional public works staff, admitted the landfill site is nearing capacity, but emphasizing the leachate continues to filter through the fill and into the river for years after a landfill site is completed. "So the money will not be wasted," he commented in a telephone interview.

## Committee interviews seven waste experts

Seven consulting firms with expertise in waste management will be considered by the Halton Waste Management Committee Thursday.

The committee is interviewing applicants to determine which will be selected to advise it on waste management.

They include Phillips Planning and Engineering Ltd. of Burlington, SNC of Toronto, M. M. Dillon Ltd. of Toronto, Middletown Associates of Toronto, Kilborn Ltd. of Toronto, James F. MacLaren Ltd. of Willowdale and Gore and Storrie Ltd. of Toronto.

The interviews will be in camera. A press conference will follow at approximately 3 p.m. The decision to interview all seven applicants was made at the committee's meeting at regional headquarters in Oakville Friday.

## Gap closes

Farm family income rose more than non-farm family income between 1971 and 1975. The increase was the result of better farm revenues rather than more off-farm work.

The income gap between urban and farm families was reduced over the five years. In 1971, an average farm family earned only 70 per cent as much as an urban family of the same size. But by 1975 the proportion had increased to 91 per cent. In 1975, a farm family earned about \$13,100 while an urban family earned about \$14,100 in net income.
