Fur, Feathers and Steel

The three blended together properly, resemble insects on which trout feed. There are thousands of different kinds so the fly tying field is a vast one that requires much time, patience and research. Especially, if the fly tier intends to do something to match the hatch or his favourite under water nymph. A good many quickie products though, that emerge from the vise will produce many trout, but unknown to the tier his imitation does resemble trout food which provides trout for the creel and later on a delicious breakfast or supper to which so many people look forward.

Nymphs

Most nymphs, for best results, should be tied on the sparse side. Most naturals are, although they range greatly in size. Some artificials are best when retrieved very slowly, others produce when the drift method is used. A close watch for leader or line pull back is required here if one wants to hook takers. Most of the food a trout consumes is taken under water.

It's this food that adds ounces in weight, and inches in girth and length as well as a special flavor to the meat.

Minimum weights

The weights are black bass smallmouth four pounds or over; largemouth five pounds or over; northern pike 15 pounds or over; maskinonge 20 pounds or over; walleye (pickereel) eight pounds or over; Lake trout or splake 15 pounds or over; rainbow trout six pounds or over; brook trout three pounds or over; and salmon 12 pounds or over.

The contest is open from April 28 until November 30. More than one form should be in each and every tackle box. They are available at most tackle outlets.
