Fur, Feathers and Steel The three blended together properly, resemble insects on which trout feed. There are thousands of different kinds so the fly tying field is a vast one that requires much time, patience and research. Especially, if the fly tier intends to tie something to match the hatch or his favourite under water nymph. A good many quickie products though, that emerge from the vise will produce many trout, but unknown to the tier his imitation does resemble trout food which provides trout for the creel and later on a delicious breakfast or suppor to which so many people

look forward. Most nymphs, for best results, should be tied on the sparse side. Most naturals are, although they range greatly in size. Some artificials are best when retrieved very slowly, others produce when the drift method is used. A close watch for leader or line pull back is required here if one wants to hook takers. Most of the food a trout consumes is taken under water.


