The collection of cars are travelling from

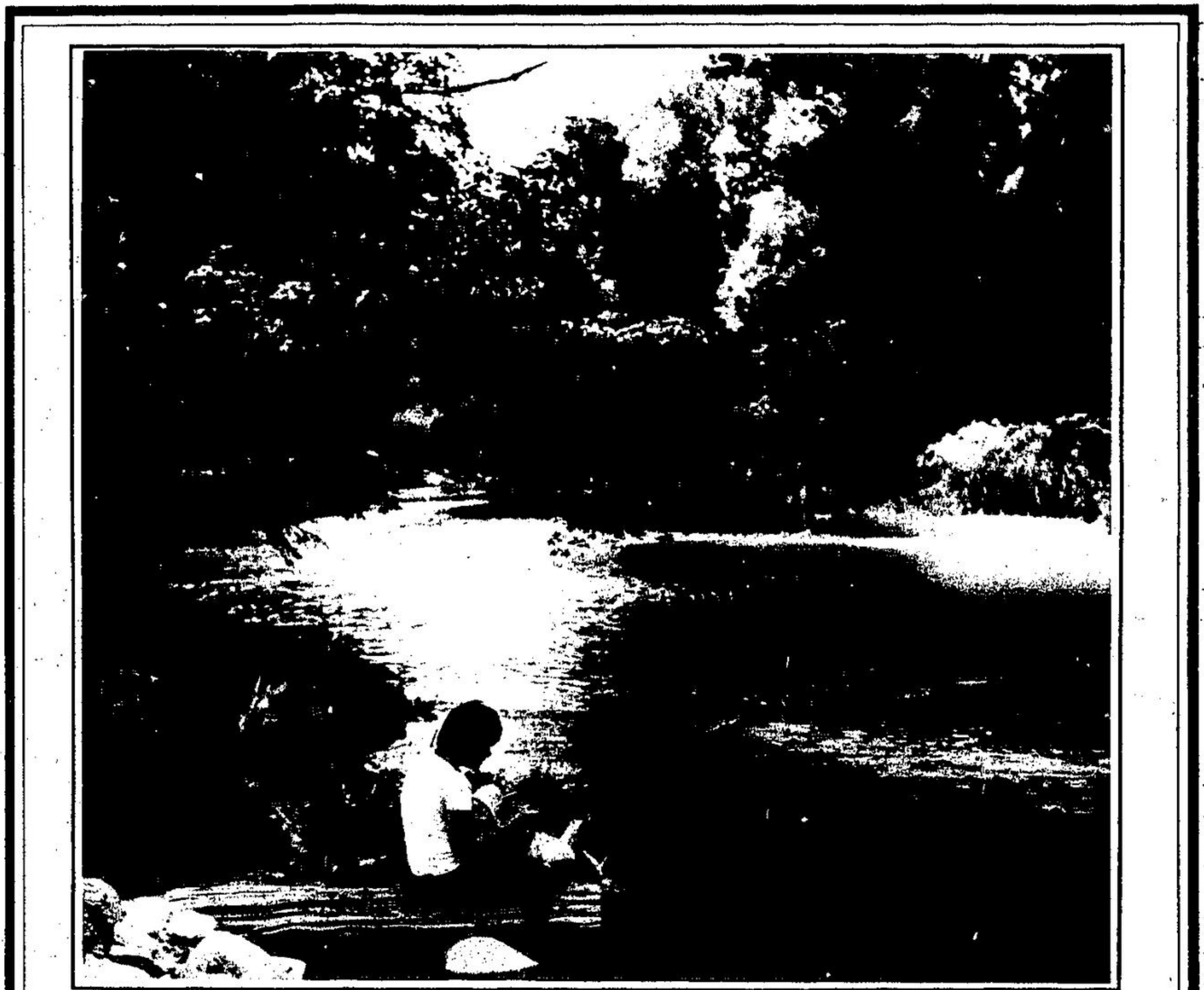
Kitchener and are expected to arrive at 11 a.m. and stay until 2 p.m.
