He made it to the door of the house but the wind sucked him out, whirling him down into the ravine, while the truck and the roof of the house flew over his head. He was treated at the hospital for cuts and bruises, but is otherwise okay.

The barn disappeared, and both ends of the house are gone, the garage at one end and a bedroom and bathroom at the other. They believe the stone fireplace in the centre saved the rest of the house. They could find no trace of the chesterfield or bathtub. A second chesterfield in a basement room was found in the ravine wrapped around a tree, while the love-seat and chair were left sitting in the room. They said it was unbelievable the debris, grass and wet earth that was in the cupboards and everywhere. Bev and Jim think they are lucky to be alive, and marvel that there weren't more people killed.

Plaza planned for Erin Twp.

Mark Hebner and Perry Wilson are interested in developing a shopping plaza on the north side of 17 sideroad at 24 highway. They will need an official plan amendment, severance, and a zoning amendment. During the discussion with Erin Township Council it was found the land was low, with bush, and would need several feet of fill. Also, it is on a dead end road owned by the county of Wellington, and not serviced in the winter. They decided to talk to Erin Village because it is a development on the edge of Erin Village.

Of the four tenders received for road work on the Glen Devon subdivision, Erin Township Council awarded the contract to Armbrö Limited at \$45,674.46.

There were several delegations at the council meeting in the municipal building. Bob Stewart offered his services to do by-law enforcement on dogs, night patrol, snow removal and water sprinklers.

Georgian Bay Aggregates Limited, having won the tender to supply the Ministry of Transportation and Communication with winter sand stockpiles by quoting their tender on the basis of using the Armstrong pit, wanted a letter from council saying they didn't object to the wayside pit. The request was granted.

Council passed the motion to allow the annexation of the triangle of land north of Erin to Erin village. Council didn't object to the annexation providing the township was adequately compensated, and providing they didn't allow development which would prevent the road from going through some day.

The tender of Ray Kennedy for \$6,652 for building sidewalks in Hillsburgh, was accepted and the motion passed, also that 50 per cent subsidy be requested from MTC.

A by-law to sign an agreement with the Ministry of Environment to receive \$2,000 to improve the garbage disposal site, was given the third reading.
