I finally did it! After slowing down 10 miles an hour while driving, I finally got 25 per cent better gas mileage. Compared with winter mileage, I actually get about 35 per cent more miles per gallon.

A few weeks ago, I reported in this column I had slowed down five miles an hour, and had a 12 per cent savings. These figures are for combination of highway and city driving, with a car that is overdue for a tune-up, both contributing factors to mileage.
