Cobourg captures PWSA Championship Rockwood Juveniles play spoiler role

Rockwood played host to the Provincial Women's Softball Association (PWSA) Juvenile Championships on the weekend and the area team provided a couple of upsets before bowing out.

Rockwood, who received an entry in the tourney as the host centre, provided area fans with some thrilling baseball as they split four games to finish the Provincial Championships in fifth spot. There were nine teams at the event.

The PWSA Championships are not run like most tournaments. To be eliminated in PWSA events you

must lose two games. That was the case in the final match-up. In quarter-final action North Bendale dropped a 5-0 decision to Cobourg. It was the first loss for North Bendale giving them the right to continue playing.

In the finals North Bendale again, met Cobourg, this time scoring a 2-1. With each team having one loss to their record a third game had to be played between the two centres with Cobourg emerging as 4-0 winners and provincial champs.

Rockwood surprised Riverside of Windsor in the first game of the tournament 3-1. Rockwood gave up only a first inning tally to the Windsor before Marilyn Kelly came on in relief stumping the Riverside bats. All three Rockwood runs came in the fifth inning of the contest.

In their second game Rockwood lost an 8-7 heartbreaker in extra innings to the eventual silver medalists from North Bendale. Their third match was as exciting as the second with the area girls coming out on top of a 4-3 extra inning win over Port Colborne.

Rockwood's second loss of the tourney came on Sunday morning when they met Riverside for the

second time. Riverside revenged the first game loss by scoring a 7-2 win and eliminating the hosts.
