Town recaptures softball title

The Town of Halton Hills softball team have recaptured the Georgetown Post Office Fun Day trophy for the third time in the tournament's five year history.

After seven innings the final game between the Town and the Random Car Club went into overtime with the Works Department coming in with two runs in the bottom of the eighth inning, winning 8-7. With the score tied at 7-7 after seven the two

teams went into extra time. One run by the Random Car club in the top of the eighth put them on top. However Mike Richmond tied things up after being batted in by George Poulson and Poulson came home with the winning run on a Fred Allen single.

Starting out the day, the Georgetown Post Office failed to deliver and were dropped by the Halton Regional Police 19-0. Georgetown Volunteer firefighters moved

up after defeating the Junior Farmers 8-2. Random car club started their move to finals after defeating Jaycees 7-6. Championship team for this year, the Town Works dropped the Glen Ladies by a score of 26-7. Last in the first round of softball action was the close match between the Georgetown Referees Association with the refs coming out 5-3 winners.

Halton Regional Police team qualified for the semi-finals after taking over the Firefighters 13-6. The Town edged the Referees Association out of the semi-finals by a score of 5-0.

In semi-final action the Police and the Random Car club played a close game moving out of regulation time and into two extra innings. At the end of regulation time the score was 5-5 with Random coming back with two runs at the top of the ninth. The Police failed to come back with enough runs and the game ended with a final score of 7-6 for Random.

The Works Department were given a bye and advanced directly to the finals.

At the beginning of the day the Police issued a challenge to other teams to meet or top a donation of \$50 to the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. Six other offers brought the challenge total to \$485. Georgetown Legion made a private donation of \$200 and the concession booth at the park donated \$50. Together with these

donations, gate receipts and private donations a total of \$1,094.69 was collected. All proceeds from the day are going to the North Halton Association.

Golf tips

Proper use of the wedge can shave more shots off your game than you ever thought possible. You may never smash drives and rifle iron shots like the pros but there is no reason you cannot learn to be accurate with a wedge. There is not a great deal of strength or co-ordination necessary to use this club properly, just confidence and the employment of a few basic fundamentals.

1. Use an open stance to shorten swing.
1. Play the ball opposite your left heel.
3. Strike the ball a descending blow.
4. Keep yourself steady over the ball (don't sway).

Never try to hit a wedge flat out. It is a finesse club. If you want more distance, hit more club. Trust the loft on the face of the wedge. Many players try to scoop the ball off the ground and end up digging a trench. Let the club do the job it was designed to do. Practice builds confidence. Practise with your wedge until it feels like an extension of your arm.
