For 27 years Nino Braida has been associated with the Acton Fall Fair Board. Before that, even when he was a small boy living right beside the Fairground gate, he was always fascinated with the annual event.

In 1952 Nino became an associate director moving up the ladder until he was president of the fair during 1961-'62. Now he's a past-president, an associate director, "just one of the workers," he modestly describes himself.

However, this "worker" was the youngest Actonian to receive the Agricultural Service Diploma in 1972.

Love for Callle

Nino's love has always been for cattle. Even as a little boy wide-eyed at the fair he never had time for the midway rides - he hung around the cattle ring.

In 1944, when his family came to live on the Queen Street farm that is now the Glenlea Subdivision, he was able to indulge his love of cattle by helping with his family's herd of Guernseys.

"We were part-time farmers," comments Nino who works with Blow Press.

That love of cattle also led Nino into 4H club and he is proud of being instrumental in getting 4H clubs started in the north end of Halton. For 22 years he was a club leader and for 22 years he never missed a meeting, either calf club or field and crop club. He served two terms as president of Halton 4H Club Leaders Council during '71 and '72. His years on Fall Fair executive have all been with the Cattle Board.

Changes Over 25 Years

In all those years Nino Braida has seen a lot of changes in a fair that started in 1913.

It's grown and improved, leaping from a class C fair to a B fair two years ago.

Nino says the Acton Fair was always considered one of the best Class C fairs in Ontario and the board wish to make it one of the finest Class B in the pro-

In order to qualify for upgrading, a fair has to offer a set amount in prize money and Acton has gradually upped its offerings from \$8 for first in the cattle ring in the early 50's to a hearty \$50 now.

Fair budget has risen from \$7,000 when Nino joined the board in '52 to just over \$56,000 last year. The fair board met four times a year 25 years ago and now meets every month.

"We have long range planning now," comments Nino, "we can't throw it together like we used to". According to Nino, cattle facilities have improved immensely. At one time, exhibitors washed their cattle in Fairy Lake. Now there's water under presure and a comfortable area to prepare beasts for

One innovation Nino is particularly proud of is the PA system at the cattle ring. He gets to use it a lot because he's been the cattle show MC for the past umpteen years.

The junior show has been built from "nothing" to "one of the best in the province," Nino Says.

"We feel we have a top notch junior show". He feels a lot of the adult exhibitors showing at Acton today started out as juniors. Steer in the Soup

In addition to the many changes, Nino remembers some unusual incidents over the years. One such happened when a steer being unloaded bolted off the truck and leaped gally into the pond. It swam for its life and ended up crossing the pond and disappearing into the bush that is now Lakeview subdivision. It took three hours to round him up and he was in no shape to show after that. In fact, Nino said everyone was surprised the steer was able to swim the pond and at one point it was thought he would be

In all the years of the fair Nino remembers, last year was the first year a cattle show had to be can-

Corn cob capers at Mountsberg

Corn Cob Capers is the name for the Mountsberg Wildlife Centre's fall program weekends beginning September 1 until the 30 and including Labor Day. The program includes a pioneer corn festival, an old-fashloned cook-out with fresh corn and apple cider and a demonstration of an authentic corn mulcher; country educational demonstration; which include square dancing, old time fiddling, bird banding and puppets; tractor drawn hay rides; horse drawn wagon rides; and an interpretive program with film and slide talks.

Heritage language fee discontinued

The heritage language Cultural aspects and program will once again be offered at six separate schools in Halton but the board will discontinue the registration fee.

Halton Separate School Board moved Tuesday evening, August 28, to discontinue the practice of charging a registration fee due to the improvement in the level of provincial funding effective September, 1979. Director of education Cliff Byrnes said the estimated costs for the program this amount to \$40,000. The board is eligible for grant assistance to a maximum of \$43,335.

celled. The heavy downpour caused cancellation of the Sunday events, including the dairy show.

The parade has also grown from a school children's parade led by the Acton Citizen's Band to the large assortment of floats, bands, and entries today.

The parade was in sorry state when ten to 12 years ago the school board decided it could no longer sponsor or organize the school childrens parade. However, the Ladies' Board stepped in, canvassing town for floats and entries, setting the parade back on its

"The Ladies Committee take up the gap so often when we fall down," remarks Nino.

When Nino was president the exhibit hall for handicrafts, crops, and baking was lost when the curling rink was demolished. Two tents were rented for these exhibits till the arena became available two years later.

The Fall Fair Board raised so much money, around \$7,000, to assist with the building the community centre they were in a position to ask for and receive a 99 year lease on the park for three days a year in order to hold the fair.

When Regional Government came in, Nino says the fair board was a little concerned about their lease with the old town council. However, he hastens to say the new county council have been

"very co-operative." Other innovations in recent years in the Fall Fair's history include the opening of "Main Street" down the park allowing for spectator progress to any area. Before that, Nino explains, a cattle show visitor had to be keen enough to brave the horse show ring and its' attendant waiting horses and riders milling around in order to get to the back of the park where cattle beasts were.

Miss Acton Fair, initiated 16 years ago, was the first of its' kind in Southern Ontario, In fact, when the Canadian National Exhibition decided to hold their Fall Fair Queen contest a few years ago, it was the Acton Board they consulted.

Looking back over his years with 4H and the Acton Fair Board, Nino Braida says the most rewarding benefit of his involvements is in the wonderful friendships he has made and the feeling of accomplishment he has.
