It really wasn't a good day for salmon hunting on Lake Ontario but despite this Lloyd Reid. Kenny Snell, Gary George and myself kept our appointment with Jim Edwards, professional charter boat captain of the salmon hunte, the Black Water, and his first mate Mark Edwards.

These two salmon hunters are experts when it comes to operating the Black Waterwith up to date fishing equipment.

Downriggers The downriggers were Big Jon's and the 6-8 1/2

foot rods were Deawa's 4716's. The reels were the popular millionare's, with 20 pounds test line.

Twin Engines

The 33 foot Black Water is powered with twin engines. They don't waste time going out or coming back in and the fridge, stove, dining and sleeping quarters, plus wash room facilities went a long way to make our cruise an enjoyable one.

Recorder

The Lowrance Trueline recorder is the popular CRG-1510. It records the depth, ba t fish and game fish, plus bottom structure. Approximately 55 boats were counted trolling in a pod on the horizon and news on the radio informed us four salmon were caught. Our skippers decided to stay off Coronation Park and keep the name of the game alive. "Salmon Hunting."

Lures

Lures used behind the orange, silver, and green dodgers were, orange plugs, small thin wobblers and twinkle flies.

Two good ones smashed the lures and bounced the rods but were lost after a short tussle.

A good strike in mid-afternoon almost bounced the outside rod out of the holder but Gary George saved the day and played the salmon while our skipper trolled along for approximately one mile. Jim Edwards netted the prize that saved the day.

It weighed over 13 pounds and its girth matched its length.

It was weighed at the Toronto Star's official weigh-in station at Conroy Bait and Tackle, 80 Bronte Road, and that is right below the store at the Fisherman's Wharf. This famous Bait and Tackle shop has been there for two weeks and it's to be a permanent location.

The lures, rods, and equipment are eye bogg-

The weigh scales have to close at 8 p.m. and frozen entries are not accepted. But it's OK to keep the catch on ice until 8 a.m. the next morning. It's the strict rules of the Toronto Star Contest.

McCauley going to camp despite vision problems

Even though his vision problems haven't been remedied, Georgetown resident and top-notch National Hockey League referee John McCauley will report to training camp this Sunday in Etobi-

Two other local hockey officials, referee Bryan Lewis and linesman Ron Finn, will attend the same camp.

McCauley underwent another operation to correct his double vision problem last month but it hasn't solved the problem. He was struck in the left eye in a New York

City bar by an intoxicated, irate fan following the final game of the Challenge Cup in February. A few days later he removed himself from an

NHL game at Maple Leaf Gardens after one period because he couldn't see a single image. Since then he has undergone surgery several times as well as other treatment.

In the last operation his right eye muscles were tightened.

"I don't notice any improvement but the doctors are encouraged," McCauley said, adding his last tests left his physician, an eye specialist, "optimistic." He said when he turns his head to a certain angle he can see a single image.

With another check-up coming this week Mc-Cauley feels another operation is likely.

He will attend the training camp and work out

with the other officials, hoping his eye will recover before the season begins. McCauley says the league won't allow him to

work exhibitions and regular season games wearing glasses or until he can produce a medical clearance pronouncing him ready to resume work. If he can't work games, McCauley will work as a supervisor. .
