public health unit, a hospital, a social planning council or an independent agency. The first of the services will be operated by a variety of local agencies: the VON in Windsor for Essex County; St. Joseph's Hospital in Guelph for Wellington County; and the public health units in Peel and Kingston for those areas. District health councils throughout the province have been asked to identify the need, then recommend a local health care agency to operate a community Placement Co-ordination Service. Mr. Timbrell said. Each program recommended by a council becomes eligible for financing when a majority of hospitals, nursing homes, for the aged and other agencies in the area have committed themselves to make complete use of the service.

Mr. Timbrell said that the attending physician will determine what sort of care is required, whether it's nursing home care, chronic hospital care, care in the patient's home or in a senior citizen's home, or other health assistance. The physician will then consult the Placement Co-ordination Service for the latest information on types of accommodation available in the community.

He said that the first of these services will be set up in the four areas listed and will operate with the assistance of local advisory committees made up of health and health care professionals. District health councils and advisory bodies and do not become involved in the actual operation of services. "These services will provide a single channel through which hospitals and the community can ensure that the patient is placed in programs or long-term facilities suitable to their individual need," Mr. Timbrell said.

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The new service will also provide information data on specific continuing care needs in each community, he said. There are now 21 district health councils in the province covering 80 per cent of the population outside Toronto. On July 13 of this year, Mr. Timbrell announced formation of a six-member steering committee to work toward establishing a Metropolitan Toronto District Health Council.
