Over 175 attended the second annual reunion of Lorne School on Saturday at Ospringe School.

Former students came from across Ontario for the afternoon of re-acquainting, with seven former teachers also making the trek.

Bert Davidson, a former trustee was on hand, as was Barbara (Davidson) McMullen, who was a fourth generation attending the school. Mr. and Mrs. Andy McDowell, the present owners of the school who have fixed it up as their home had photos of the building on hand for all those to see. Laura (Johnston) Graham of Picton, Ontario came the furthest, and Ivy (Cleaves) Watson, 94 and Hazel (Gibbons) Murray, 92, were the two oldest students there.

The next reunion was planned for five years from now until it was discovered the school's 100th anniversary is in three years. They now plan to meet in 1982.

The school was first constructed in 1880. Tidbits of historical information were published in a brochure for the reunion. Included in it the booklet was a brief recent history:

"Lorne School became part of Esquesing School Area at the end of 1949 and closed its doors in 1959 under the Esquesing School Board. The students from the Lorne area then attended the new Speyside School under a new Halton County School Board System.

"When Lorne School became part of the Esquesing School Area in 1949 there were no longer three trustees but one representative to the Township board. The three men who held this position were R.L. Davidson, William Dobbie

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OPP seek fatal hit-and-run pick-up truck

Guelph OPP are searching for a blue pick-up truck in connection with a fatal hit and run accident north of Rockwood early in the morning of September 1.

Guelph resident James Cowan, 28, died after he was struck by a pick-up truck on Wellington Road 27 one mile north of Rockwood. The truck left the scene of the accident.

The pick-up vehicle is blue, possibly a 1973 model, but the make is unknown. The vehicle has white mirrors on both sides. The right mirror is believed by police to have been broken and is missing the rubber molding.

The vehicle has about four yellow lights on the rear of the cab and possibly two yellow fog type lights on front. There is a brown box in the back of the truck.
