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**Erin twp.**

**Special demo first of a kind**

Mr. and Mrs. O.B. Streep of Illinois, and Dave Sherratt, field man from Erin Township Fire Department, visited Erin Township council Tuesday evening, and members had a pre-look at the rescue vehicle which will be used at an Auto Extrication Demo at Hillsburgh Sept. 29 and 30.  
Mr. Streep is beginning a tour around Ontario, and this two day demonstration for the County of Wellington firefighters, under the auspices of Seneca College, is the first of its kind for a volunteer fire department in the whole of Canada. It will give firefighters a better knowledge of taking a victim out of a vehicle, and will show how to do it with the minimum of equipment. Real people will be used as victims. The Township firemen are looking forward to a very informative and instructive time.  
A number of people appeared at council meeting, making a lengthy session. Some were concerned about the proposed by-laws for road closures. Mr. Seaford owns adjacent property to part of George St. in the village of Hillsburgh which will be stopped up, but on learning the facts, said he had no objections. Part of George St. will be conveyed to Robert and Lillian Dempster, and a part designated for road allowance.  
Dave Wright, Graham Gillespie and Mr. and Mrs. Garry Parkin were interested in the letter of objection received by council concerning the by-law for road closure on lot 12, concession II. This letter, signed by 17 concerned citizens, said the change would make a dangerous intersection travelling east on the

county road. Mr. Wright suggested that these people were not aware there is a proposed third lane, due to an OMB hearing, and do not know the road will be made wider. Another objection was that the school bus drivers used this strip for turning, but it is not used for that purpose now. The children are picked up elsewhere. Mr. Wright said if there is a safety problem it should be dealt with by council. "The question of safety will have a bearing on council's decision" clerk Clive Beardwood said. Reeve Wheeler asked each member of council to go and have a look at the corner and study the angles, and they would deal with it at the next meeting.  
Mr. Wright also brought to council's attention an open letter from Mono Township about the new government control of pits and quarries, where an aggregate quota will be put on municipalities and each township will be told how much gravel to produce each year. Mono is asking support of a resolution that no policy be imposed on municipalities without municipal approval. Mr. Wright left the letter with council for study.  
Robert Nicoll of the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, and Mr. Howe, their solicitor, do not feel a severance is what they want on lot 18, concession 3, and came back to get approval for a second house on the farm for their farming help. Council agreed to consider a by-law to permit a second dwelling, containing an agreement to permit a temporary dwelling in the form of a mobile home, effective immediately, subject to a clause ensuring its removal if the re-zoning request is not granted by the OMB.

David Heaslip is now re-building after his barn and sheep were destroyed by fire. He has purchased more sheep and hopes to increase the number. He applied to council for a zone change to build a house for a hired hand. He was instructed to see his solicitor and draw up a simple by-law.  
A by-law was prepared authorizing the reeve and clerk to execute a contract with Armbro Materials and Construction Limited to grade and pave in Hillsburgh subdivision at \$45,874.64 contract price.  
A lamb was killed by a wolf, and one was killed by a dog last month, to a total value of \$120.  
A motion was passed to instruct the road superintendent to re-apply for a wayside permit on the Dewar pit, lot 22, concession 8, to be used only at the land fill site.  
Another motion carried that the price of fill be increased from \$2.50 to \$2.75 a tandem load, and from \$1.25 to \$1.50 a single load.  
Council said they were not prepared to replace a fence on lot 29, concession 6. An agreement had been made with the road superintendent a year or so ago to take away the posts and broken wire which was on the ground, and clean up the fence bottom, when re-building the road, but no agreement was made to replace the fence.  
Erin Union Cemetery asked Erin Township for a \$600. yearly grant. Council is requesting members of the cemetery board to come and talk with them.

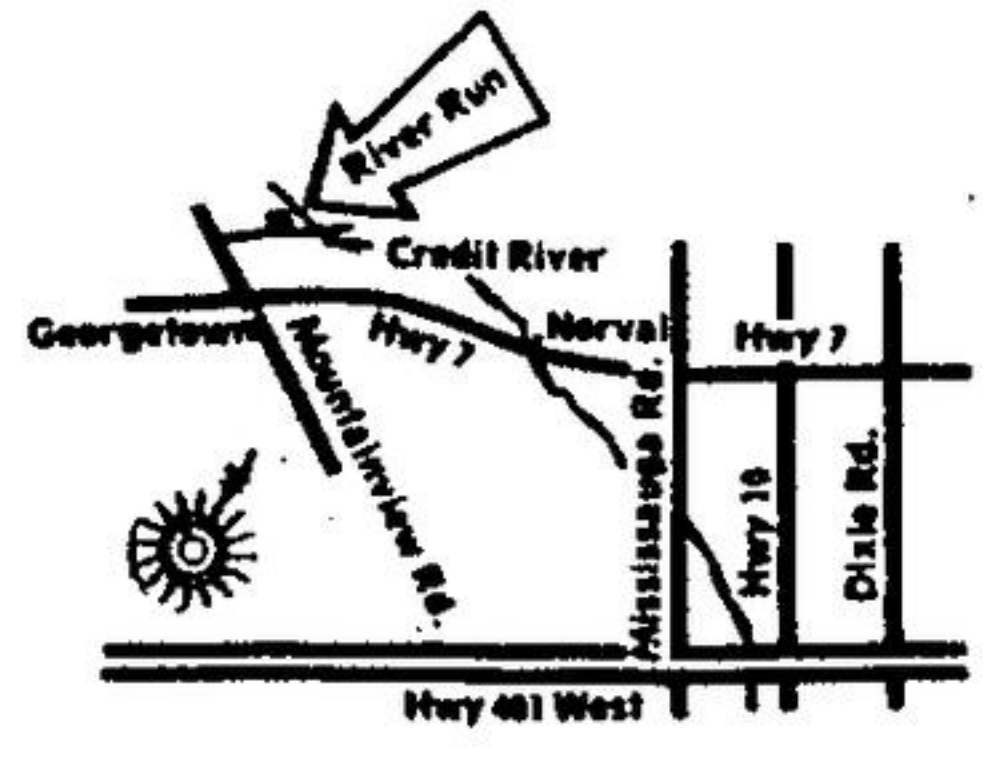
