## Township to supply pumps

Rockwood ratepayers who require sewer pumps to connect their homes to the main municipal sewer line have received an answer from Eramosa Council. A resolution passed September 12, proposes

"that Eramosa Council would be willing to supply and install sewage pumps to three lots; namely H. Woellmer, V. Dunne, and Wm. Van Der Heyden. The maximum cost per lot is not to exceed \$1,000.

"In lieu of this proposal the township would forgive sewer frontages until such time the properties may have to hookup because of Ministry of Health regulations. And be it further resolved that the township will not assume any responsibility for the maintenance or operation of the sewer pumps. As a third alternative the township will lower the elevation of the sewer connection at the property line to the lowest possible elevation that the sewer main will allow."

## Trailer park still is not desirable

Eramosa Council's opinion that a trailer-park recreational facility is undesirable for the township, remains unchanged.

Shiloh Ranch representatives, R. Webb solicitor, D. Scarth, Planner and Frank Bertagnoli owner, held a special open meeting with council, Sept. 12, proposing the RR 1, Rockwood campsite and recreational facility.

Mr. Bertagnoli stated that he bought the property ten years previously and a few years ago had operated a small park with horse back riding facilities. The land is not suitable for extensive farming operation, he said. Council discussed the financial benefit to the township, fire protection, police protection and the effect on nearby farms with the influx of campers before stating their opinion.

## Race for Liberal nomination

One of Ontario's farm spokesmen has declared his intentions to seek a Liberal nomination for the upcoming provincial election expected next spring.

Elbert van Donkersgoed, Executive Director of the Christian Farmers Federation of Ontario will seek the nomination of the riding of Wellington-Dufferin-Peel. The riding is a rural-suburban mixture including the following towns: Arthur, Bolton, Caledon, Caledon East, Drayton, Elora, Erin, Fergus, Grand Valley,

Hillsburg, Moorefield, Mount Forest, and Shelburne.

Nomination night has been set for Thursday, October 18, in the Erin High School. At least two other men have indicated that they will seek the nomination.

Mr. van Donkersgoed has taken a leave of absence as president of the Wellington-Dufferin-Peel Provincial Liberal Association to seek the nomination. Bill Borovoy of Elora, Association Vice-President, is acting president. Mr. van Donkersgoed has been an active Liberal for some time. In 1978 he was the Riding Association Secretary.

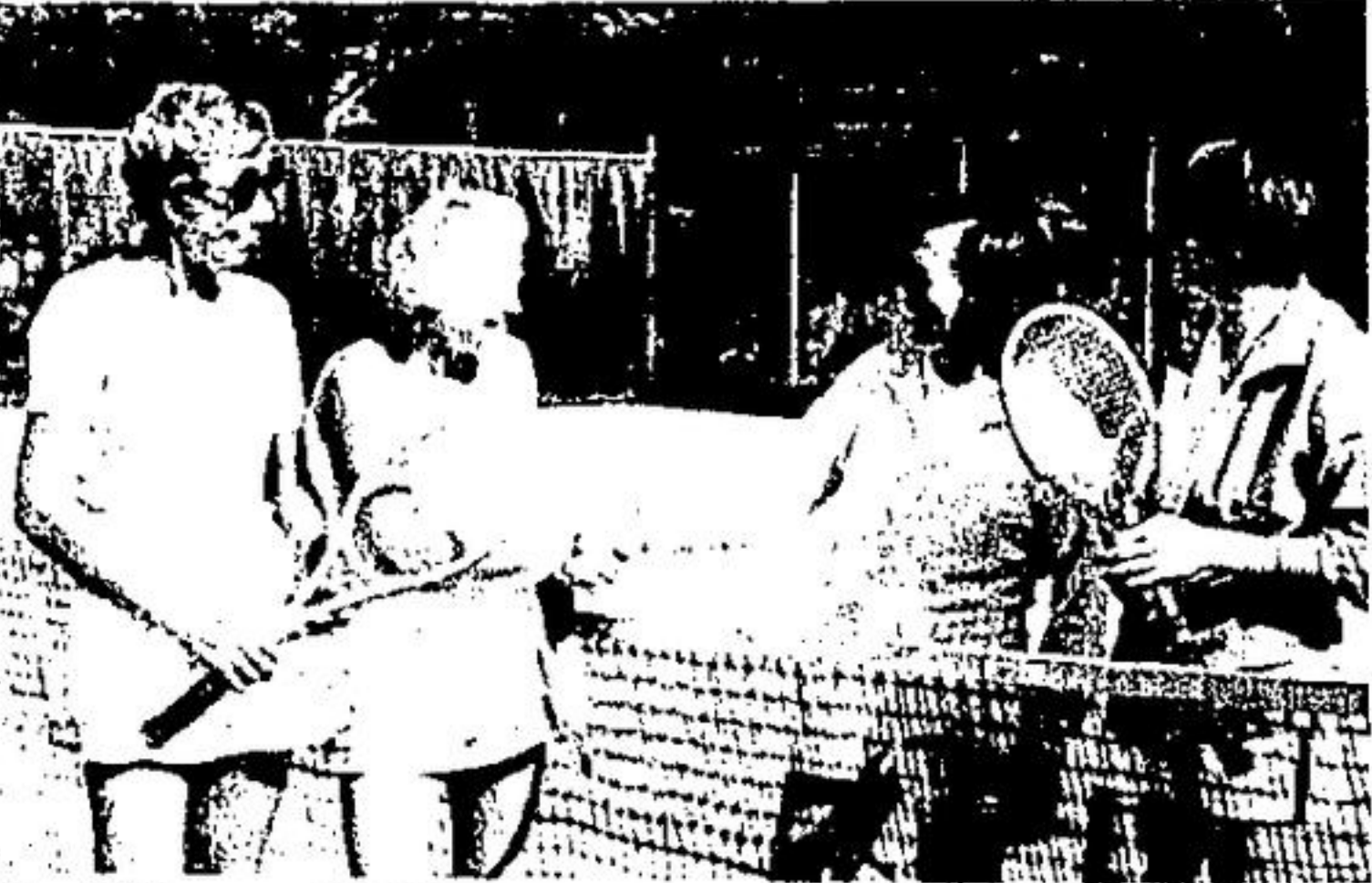
