

# Philbrook runs in red while others in black

Two of the three major candidates in Halton in the May 22 federal election received more money in campaign contributions than they spent in campaign expenses.

Friday was the deadline for all six candidates in Halton riding to file election expense reports with Joe Anderson, returning officer for this riding.

Both Otto Jelinek, victorious Progressive Conservative candidate and Doug Black, New Democratic Party candidate, received more in contributions than they spent in expenses.

The difference according to the Election Act, goes either to the respective party or the Receiver-General of Canada.

Dr. Frank Philbrook, the Liberal candidate and former incumbent, spent over \$11,000 more than he received in campaign contributions.

The Act says, in effect, a candidate is responsible

for expenditures made on his behalf and must make up any difference.

Independent candidate Robert Ritchie received no campaign contributions and spent \$3,435.03, mostly on signs and flyers.

Mr. Jelinek received \$29,495 in contributions, and spent \$26,624.34.

The limit on spending in campaigns is \$29,532.25 per candidate.

Of Mr. Jelinek's \$29,495 in revenue, \$17,735 was donated by individual persons and \$11,760 came from private corporations.

There were 399 donations of \$100 or less and 46 donations of more than \$100. The largest single donation was by a person giving \$510 to the campaign. Another individual gave \$500 and eight corporations each gave \$500.

Of Mr. Jelinek's \$26,624.34 in expenses, \$17,758.42 was spent on advertising and promotion, \$8,863.92 was spent on office supplies, and \$806.17 was spent on

travel and personal expenses. Other expenses, accounted for the rest.

The bulk of Dr. Philbrook's \$26,097.26 expenses was spent on advertising and promotion, \$16,320.29 was spent in that area. Office expenses totalled \$4,914.64 and travel and personal expenses totalled \$271.53.

Other expenses accounted for the rest of the \$26,097.26.

Dr. Philbrook's election revenue totalled \$14,713.43.

Of that, \$5,015 was received from individuals, \$250 from public corporations and \$3,075 from private corporations. The rest was obtained from the Liberal Party's fund-raising drives.

There were 59 donations of less than \$100 and 17 donations of more than \$100. The largest single donation was from one person and three corporations each gave \$500.

Mr. Black received \$9,275 in campaign contributions and spent \$7,124.35 in campaign expenses.

Of his campaign revenue, \$6,049 was donated by individuals, \$2,995.16 by trade unions and \$231.71 by NDP fund-raising.

There were 89 donations of less than \$100 and 66 donations of more than \$100. The largest single donation came from a union local in the amount of \$1,000.

Of Mr. Black's expenses, \$4,700.38 was spent on advertising and promotion, \$2,053.97 was spent on office expenses and salaries and wages totalled \$340. Other expenses accounted for the rest.

Marxist-Leninist candidate Charles Shrybman filed a report showing one campaign contribution, by the Marxist-Leninist party, in the amount of \$208.33.

Libertarian candidate Karen Selick received \$610 from 14 contributions and spent \$583.24.

# MP uses hospital to catch up calls

Halton MP Otto Jelinek has been released from Oakville-Trafalgar Hospital after being admitted two weeks ago, complaining of chest pains.

He told this newspaper he was in his office and "felt some discomfort in my chest."

The 39-year-old Oakville resident was taken to hospital and placed in intensive care unit for observation. There, he was given a week of

stress tests before being pronounced fit.

The MP said, "I did not have a heart attack. I just haven't taken any time off in a long while."

Although confined to a hospital bed for a week, Mr. Jelinek said it gave him an opportunity to get caught up returning telephone calls and dealing with constituency matters.

# CVCA to convert barn

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority will move its educational centre from Terra Cotta to the 400 acre Silvercreek Conservation Area, on the former Vaughan farm at 27 Sideroad and the Ninth Line, in September of next year.

A barn will be renovated into an office and classrooms for the school children who attend. The estimated cost of renovations is \$65,000.

Vice-chairman Howard Stewart criticized the spending of \$65,000 contending it would be better to construct a new building rather than converting a barn. He said the land will be ruined as a farm.

Roy McMillan predicted the barn would deteriorate in five or ten years, and would incur more costs than a new building.

Authority Chairman Grant Clarkson pointed out they had a quotation on converting the upper floor of the farmhouse which had come in higher than the \$65,000 figure. He claimed there is something unique in having the classes in a barn, and emphasized the barn cannot be left as is.

McMillan said the whole farm should be rented out as a unit, and wondered if there was no one interested in taking it

over. The Authority members voted to go ahead with the switch from Terra Cotta to Silvercreek for the outdoor education program and endorsed the spending of the \$65,000 to convert the barn.

About 5,000 youngsters are based on day trips to the Terra Cotta site each year from schools

# Bahai's protest persecution

Some members of the Baha'i Faith in Halton Hills met recently with various Government representatives on local provincial and federal levels, to discuss the persecution of the Baha'i community in Iran.

Isabelle Weaver, Normand Bourassa, Davina Barber and Mary Lamon, all members of the Baha'i Faith locally met with Mayor Pete Pomeroy, Julian Reed, MPP, Otto Jelinek, MP and John McDermid MP.

Since then Government intervention has stopped the wrecking of a house in Iran held sacred by the Baha'i world community. Baha'i sources said, Police guards are now posted around the house of the Bab who is a central figure of the Baha'i Faith.

Mr. Bond said, "Several months ago all Baha'i properties were confiscated by the Iranian government which assured Baha'is in writing that the seizure was for the purpose of protecting these sacred properties."

When the House of the Bab was first attacked by a crowd protests were made by the Baha'i world community to the government of Iran. Urgent appeals were also made to governments throughout the world, to intervene on behalf of the law-abiding, but persistently persecuted Baha'i community of Iran.

The House of the Bab, the forerunner of the prophet Baha'u'llah, was ordained by the Founder of the Baha'i Faith, Baha'u'llah, as a place of pilgrimage. It is held by the Iranian Baha'is on behalf of the Baha'i world community.
