

# Ice users find registration down

For two of the past three weekends the Acton Community Centre has been the setting for arena using sports groups registrations.

Four groups used the centre on Saturday to hold what was their final official registration. All groups have reported a decrease in registration numbers.

Acton Minor Hockey (Legion and Waterloo-Wellington) reported the greatest drop in enrolment for the up coming season. Their hockey leagues have only 350 registered while 431 players donned skates to enjoy the sport last year.

Anyone who has yet to register for minor hockey may do so on the first day of Waterloo-Wellington try-outs which are being planned for October 6. The Acton Figure

Skating Club estimates their registration has dropped 50 skaters but president Sheila Wilson is not too concerned. She said there are still several of last year's skaters expected to return who have not signed up. Mrs. Wilson also said that this year's registration was not highly publicized.

Anyone wishing to register with the skating club can phone Mrs. Wilson 853-2686 or by picking up the necessary forms at the Lakeview Centre or Toddler to Teens.

Acton Hockey and Skating School also has a drop in enrolment for the year. The advanced level of the school is in danger of being cancelled. Only 14 have registered while an estimated 25 are

needed for a class. Last year there were 27 in the group.

The beginners, or four to nine years age group has a total of 67 interested learners for this season, still down from last years more than 70.

An extra registration will be held on the opening night, October 2, at the Community Centre.

The Acton Industrial Hockey League was the fourth group at the registration Saturday. The Industrial League, too, was down in their registration, although only by five players. The Industrial Hockey has a limit of 66 players divided among six teams. Last year's players get first chance at playing in this league but organizer

George McPhail believed over ten of the players on the current list are newcomers.
