Referees get rate increase, body contact rule defeated at annual OMHA meeting

Two members of the Acton (Waterloo-Wellington) Minor Hockey Association were in Toronto on Saturday at the Ontario Minor Hockey Association annual meeting and election of officers.

Two of the major items on the agenda for this year's meeting included an increase in referees' fees and a rule to stop body checking in minor series atom and below. There were a total of 12 constitutional changes on the agenda and the referees' increase was one of only two passed. The no body contact rule fell by a 507 to 411 vote. The other amendment passed came from West Lincoln County Hockey Association. They proposed trophies be presented to honor all Zone Atom champions and finalists.

The referees' increase now sees the officials earning \$7 for regular season games for novice and atoms, \$8 for pee-wee, \$9 for bantam and \$10 for midget and juvenile games. Play-off

fees will be slightly higher and will also include a 20 cents per mile/12 cents per kilometre fee.

The no body contact ruling was brought forth in two different motions, one each by Belle River District Minor Hockey and Burlington Minor Hockey. Neither amendment was passed leaving atom and novice groups to continue to play the same as he's been in the past.

Acton delegates Fran McKnight and Herb Dodds remained at the meeting over the after-

noon with a special interest hoping an amendment by West Lincoln Minor Hockey that the age limit for juvenile players be extended one

year to the age of 19 for categories "BB" and below. Acton, a "BB" centre had special interest as they have had problems finding enough

players to ice a juvenile team. This season an Acton Juvenile team will operate with some players, possibly coming from midget ranks.

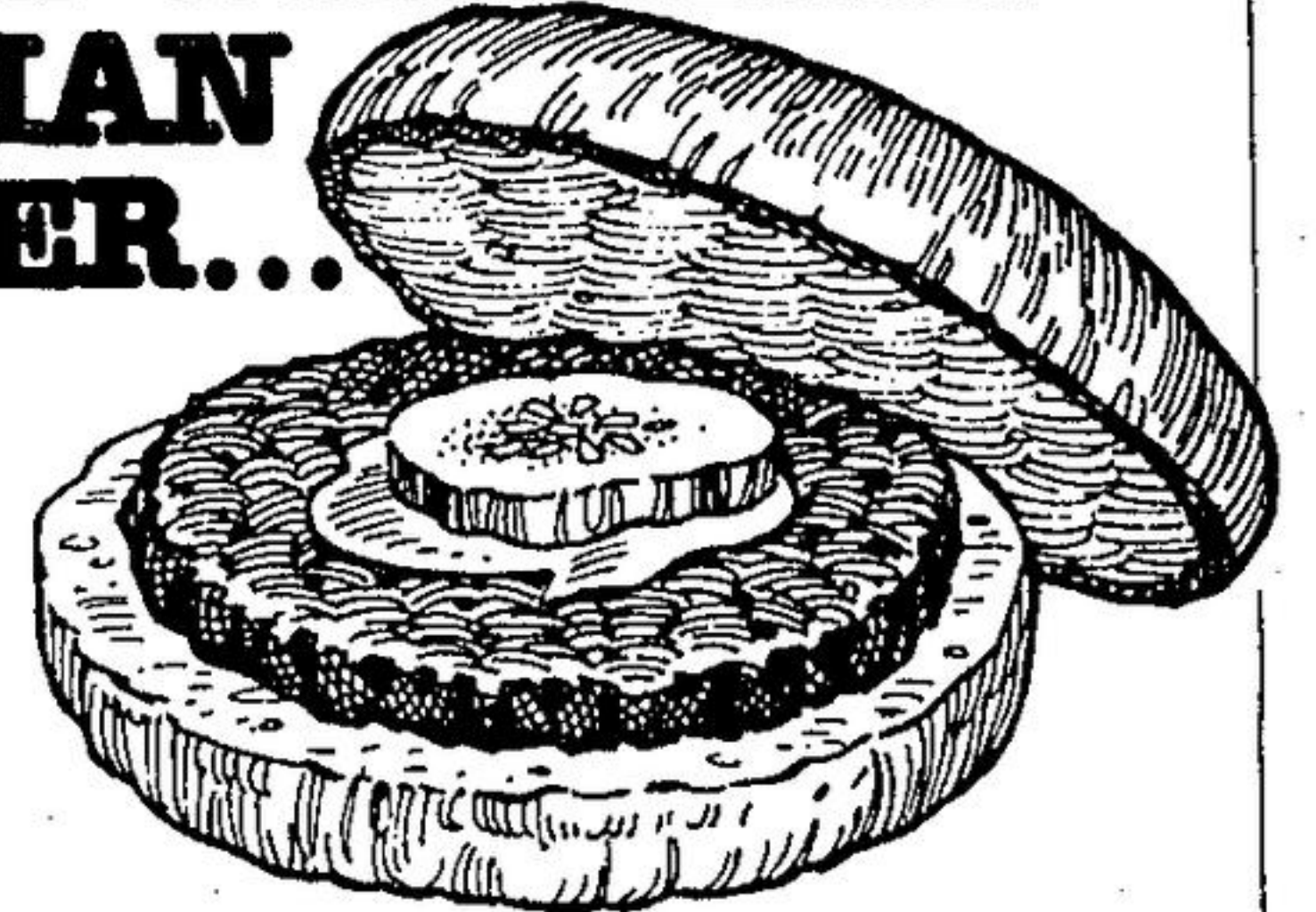

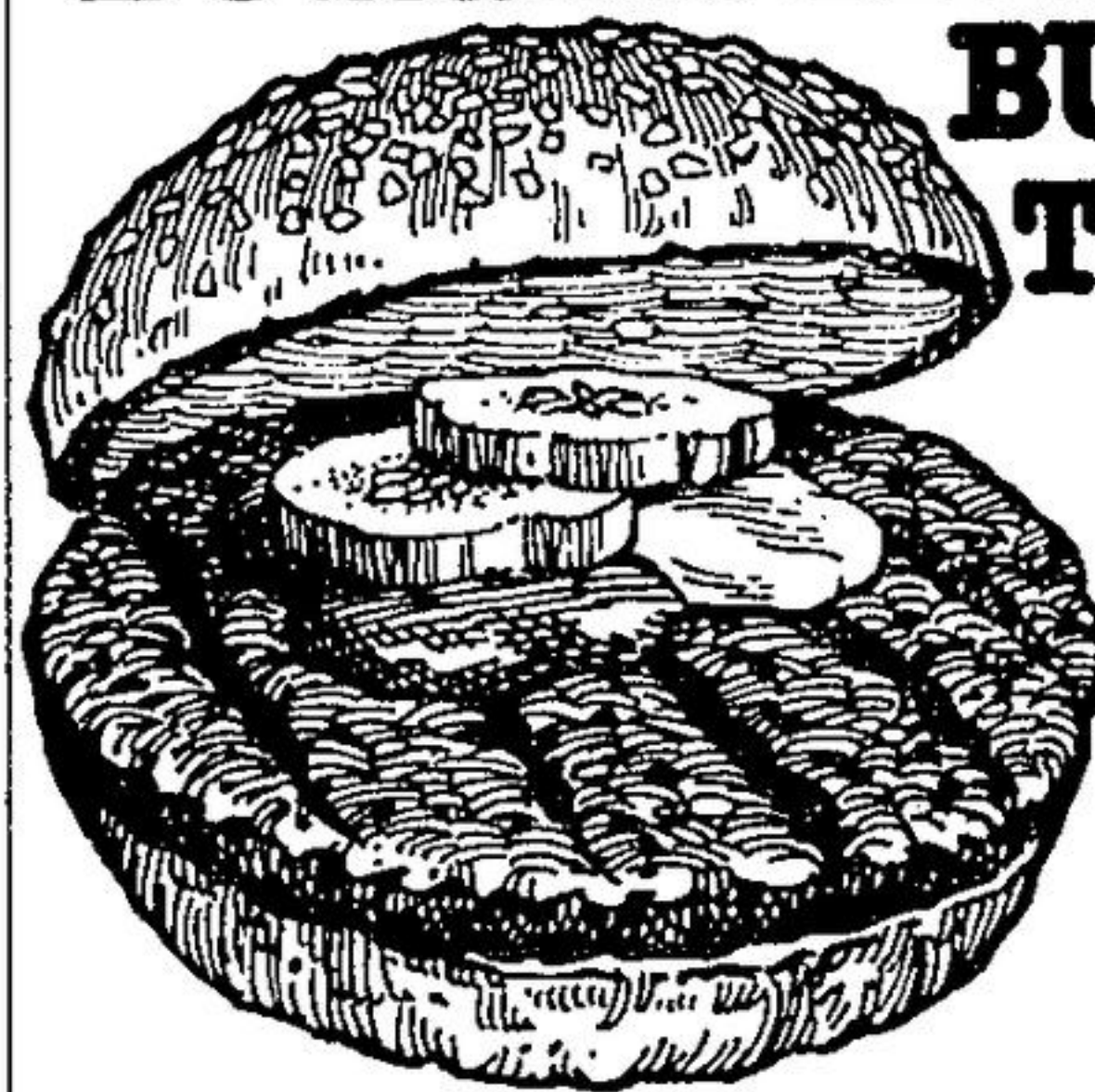
