Former clerk-treasurer K.C. Lindsay dies at 82

An Esquesing native and former clerk treasurer of the township, Kenneth Cowan Lindsay, or Cowan, and more commonly "K.C." as he was known to everyone, died Sunday October 7, in Georgelown hospital.

K.C., 82 years old, was born in 1896 on the family farm near the junction of Highway 7 and the Seventh Line, where his son Donald, the fifth generation to farm there, still lives.

He and his late wife Isabel farmed until K.C. joined Esquesing township staff as treasurer in 1943. Even before that he served the township as sheep evaluator, while continuing to farm.

During his 30 years in the township office, he took on many roles, and was treasurer, tax collector, and assistant assessor all at one. He finally was appointed clerk-treasurer, where he remained until his retirement in 1973. He retired just before
