## Fire calls up

Halton Hills firefighters have answered 28 calls so far this month, compared with the same time period last year.

In a report to Halton Hills council, fire chief Mick Holmes noted Georgetown accounted for 20 of these calls, with Acton having eight. Last year, it was 12 and three. So far this year, Georgetown has answered 150 calls and Acton 61, compared with 125 and 71 last

year to date. Of this month's calls, the report stated, six were buildings, 13 accidents, five open fires and four of other nature. Two were caused by negligence, five maintenance and 21 other causes.

This month has seen \$19,154 in damages, while last October there was only \$700. This year to date there has been \$1,109,387 in fire damages, compared with \$493,245 last year.
