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Revamping committee to improve village recreation

Big changes are in store for recreation organization in Eramosa township. Now is the time for residents to get involved in planning recreation facilities and the programs they want for the future. Plans are underway to revamp the present re-

creation committee to better represent all township interest groups and to stage open community meetings to discuss township recreation needs and priorities. Changes to the present system were decided after a combined meeting of council, recreation committee, community centre board, Lions and Lionettes representatives and provincial cultural and recreational representative Pat Duffy. Over recent years Eramosa recreation facilities have greatly improved with the establishment of Rockmosa Community Centre and the tennis courts. Rockmosa Park soccer and baseball fields will be ready for action this

spring. Recreation officials feel now is the time to reorganize to make the best cultural and recreational use of these and other township facilities. Rockmosa Community Centre operation takes the biggest chunk of recreation tax dollars. Multi-purpose, co-operative use of this facility would justify monies

spent, the group agreed. Mr. Duffy suggested alternate hall uses—baseball, soccer or tennis clinics, craft group meetings or senior citizen activities. At present the hall stages mainly dances and ban-

quets. Decisions must be made about the development of unfinished basement space in Rockmosa Community Centre and Rockmosa Park maintenance. A meeting of the
