Cagers double opposition lop-sided wins continue

The Acton High School Junior Girls' basketball team is fast becoming the talk of the Halton County league.

The Redmen started out their season defeating what was considered the league's weaker teams by outrageously large scorers. Last week the team met the league's toughest competition and again the scores were high in Acton's favor.

Last week the Redmen more than doubled Georgetown 50-24 and Oakville-Trafalgar 42-0. The wins put the Acton team alone atop the league standings with a five win and no loss record. Their toughest competition may have come last night (Tuesday) when they met second place T.A. Blakelock of Oakville. The only loss the Oakville

school had encountered in season play has come at the hands of Georgetown.

Linda Osso paced the Acton scoring, attack in both recent contests netting 19 points against Georgetown and adding another 15 to her total against Oakville-Trafalgar. Mardie Phillips also had a good night under the basket against Georgetown picking up 12 points. Lori DeBruyn added nine. Linda Osso and Dayle Robinson were the team's top rebounders in the Georgetown win while coaches Lyn McLaren and Anne Lepik had praise for the play of Nancy Wong and DeBruyn. One player the coaching staff pointed out as playing strong basketball is Dayle Robinson. Dayle plays behind Linda Osso as the team's

centre position. "She is improving each time out," says McLaren. "She played exceptionally well against Georgetown."

Against Oakville-Trafalgar the Redmen played tough defence over the first period as they built up a 5-0 lead. A good second quarter extended the lead to 24-6. Linda Osso led the team scoring with 15 points followed by Kelly White with seven and Mardie Phillips with six. Barb Wilson and Kelly White were the team's top rebounders in the contest with Oakville while Sandra Brundie and Deb Clarke were the toughest on the defense. The season ends for the junior cagers tomorrow (Thursday) in Milton. This weekend the Redmen will go after their first tournament title, to go along with a pair of

consolation championships, when they host their own event. Eight teams will compete in the Saturday matches. Acton meets Centre Wellington in their opening game on Saturday morning at 9 a.m.

Acton Industrial Hockey League resumed action at the Community Centre with three more closely played hockey games.

Lakeview Centre and Blow Press both kept their records unblemished after two weeks of action. The Centre handed Hellers their second loss with a 5-2 come from behind win while Blow Press needed a last minute goal to subdue Van's Welding. In the other game on Sunday's schedule Family Cleaners and Acton Terminal Warehouse played to a 5-5 tie.

In that game it took two late third period goals by Family to force the tie. Acton Terminal Warehouse netted the game's first goal as Chris Tennant found the range from George McPhail and Ken Slaney. Family Cleaners evened the count with a goal from Fred Allen a short time later but Ed Hillier gave the Warehouse back the lead before the first period ended. maker of the game for Blow picking up a pair of helpers while Henry Toebes added a single.

Gary Pickles netted the first two Van's goals while Evan Hayter picked up the third.

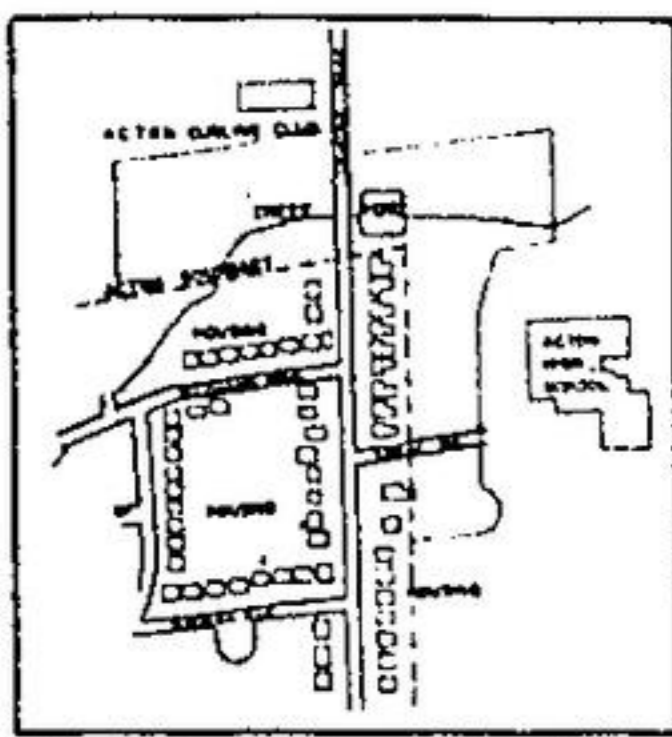
