Ministry wants rezoning reasons

The Ministry of Housing has again asked the Town of Halton Hills for justification for the rezoning of 283 acres, at Highway 25 and Five Sideroad.

In a previous letter they asked for reasons, and in a recent letter they asked for evidence of demand for dry industrial acreage, and evidence that this location is the best in town for it.

The land is directly across the road from a

large area in Milton recently zoned industrial. The Ministry suggested the industrial land in Milton may serve the demand in the Highway 401 and Highway 25 area for some time.

"It seems to me this is just one more excuse to get industry into Milton," commented Councillor Harry Levy.

The planner was directed to answer the letter giving reasons for the amendment in more detail.

High school teacher, board talks continue

Halton Board of Education and the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation are continuing contract negotiations.

Halton's 1,165 high school teachers will be in a position to strike, though what is likely to happen, according to the board's Superintendent

of Instruction John Boich is that a mediator will be appointed by the Education Relations Commission.

Mr. Boich said negotiations are taking place today (Wednesday) and Friday.

The teachers' right to strike exists in provincial education legislation. The 40-page fact finder's report was tabled with the commission Friday. Both sides may continue talking for a while and then the fact finder's report will be made public by the commission.

The sequence of events may run as follows. Five days after release of the fact finder's report, the federation can ask for the board's final offer. If that is accepted, then there is agreement. If not, a strike vote may be held.

The vote, by itself, does not mean a strike, said Mr. Boich. Under Bill 100, teachers may be poised for months with the right to strike. Mr. Boich said both sides are negotiating in a positive manner.

Reed to introduce bill

Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed will be asked to help bring trail bike legislation into Queen's Park.

Mr. Reed has been asked by Burlington council to meet and discuss methods of legislating trail bikes and mini-bikes and drivers to carry some form of liability in case of accident.

Burlington had submitted a resolution requesting licensing in 1975. This was lost on the order paper along with recommendations from a number of other municipalities.

Burlington Councillor Joan Allingham said riders are not obliged to carry any form of public liability making parents responsible, if a rider injures a third party.
