**New titles for police officers**

Halton Regional Police are taking steps to clear up any confusion in the public's mind regarding ranking of officers.

Acting Chief James Harding proposed to change some of the titles for sergeants in uniform or plain clothes.

Under the new system, to start in January, officers serving in the uniform division, courts, training bureau, public relations and crime prevention bureaus would be called sergeant and staff sergeant.

Officers assigned to criminal investigation and identification bureaus and the criminal intelligence bureau are to be called detective or detective sergeant.

**Mrs. Duby dies at 81**

A well known Rockwood woman, Winnifred Alice Duby, has died in St. Joseph's hospital, Peterborough.

Mrs. Duby had been ill for only a short time when she died October 24 in her 82nd year. Funeral service was held at the Presbyterian church, Rockwood, October 27, with Rev. C. Doehring, and Father Laurence Duby, her grandson, officiating.

Mrs. Duby was born on May 16, 1898 in Bourne-mouth, England and was the daughter of Henry Porter and Catherine E. Allen. She came to Canada in 1911 and on March 24, 1918, she married Joseph Duby in St. James rectory, Guelph.

Mrs. Duby was a member of the Rockwood Presbyterian church, the Presbyterian Women's Association and Women's Missionary Society, the Acton Golden Age Club,

the Rockwood Sunshine Club and the Legion Ladies' Auxiliary, Branch 197, Acton.

Mrs. Duby is survived by sons Alfred, Acton; Earl, Rockwood; and Kenneth, Guelph; and daughters Lucy, (Mrs. Leo Synnott), Acton; Margaret, (Mrs. Gordon Cox), Rockwood; and Catherine, (Mrs. John Cotterill), Peterborough. She is also survived by one sister Lucy Lyons, 19 grandchildren and 13 great children.

She was predeceased by her husband Joseph, son Leslie A., and one grandson Thomas Duby, as well as brothers Henry, George, and Edward Porter.
