

# Lakeview 'whitewashes' Cleaners



Former Acton Minor Hockey grad and Acton Sabre Scott Malcolm has become the latest local player to move to another centre to play junior hockey. Malcolm joined the Georgetown Gemini Friday night and has picked up four points in two games since. At press time last week Georgetown was waiting for a minor release but used what Georgetown assistant coach Chris Milne called a technicality to get the sick centre. "He was released by minor hockey three seasons ago," says Milne, "and although many teams don't know it, that is all they need."

Acton Industrial Hockey League returned to past ways for the first two games on Sunday's slate before settling down with a defensive style match for the finale. There was a time when a shut-out was not surprising and a Sunday night ritual at the Community Centre and scores like 11-6 and 10-0 were not uncommon. This season the games had been low scoring and

close, until this week that is. Lakeview Centre started the Sunday night action off in style as they showed Family Cleaners the finer points of passing and shooting, chalking up a 10-0 win. In game two it was Blow Press that supplied the bulk of the offence, netting 11 goals while Acton Terminal Warehouse managed six at the other end. In the nightcap Van's

Welding and Heller's played a tight match with the Welders coming out on top of a 4-2 decision. It was Heller's third loss in as many starts. Bart Jacobs was the top point getter in the Lakeview Centre whitewash of Family Cleaners. Jacobs managed only one goal in the match but set up six others for assists. Steve Atkinson also had a good night for the Centremen

firing three goals and assisting on a pair. Bruce Cooksley added another goal for Lakeview, assisting on three others. Ron Schmidt also fired a hat-trick. Jim Hagggett added the tenth Lakeview goal while Floyd Hillier and Brian Lloyd added single assists to the onslaught. Rick Bonnette picked up the shut-out for the Centremen, the first of the young season.

Lakeview led 4-0 after the first period and 6-0 after the second before laying up with only two third period markers. The win left Lakeview undefeated in three matches and tied for top spot with Blow Press, who scored an 11-6 win over Acton Terminal Warehouse.

In that game Blow Press built up a 5-1 first period lead and then maintained that advantage over the final 40 minutes to score their third victory. Wayne Allan led the Blow Press attack in the contest counting three goals and three assists. Ken Owen, also had a good night netting four goals and assisting on another from his defensive position. Henry Toebes counted the other hat trick for the Pressmen while Bruce MacPherson added a sin-

gle. MacPherson and Toebes added single assists to their goals while Dave Paul, Sid Barends, and goaltender Robin Insoe also picked up helpers. Gary Marsh and Ed Hillier paced the Warehouse attack, picking up three points each. Marsh fired one goal and assisted on two others while Hillier counted twice and helped on another occasion.

Chris Tennant added two goals for Acton Terminal along with a single from George McPhail. Mike Morris earned two assists for the Warehouse. Single helpers went to Mike Mitchell, Jim Cooney and Ken Slaney. There was only one penalty called in the contest, that going to Sid Barends of Blow Press. In the nightcap Van's (continued on B2)

# Acton girls capture crown at own basketball tourney

Acton Junior Girls' Basketball team capped a successful week on Saturday as they captured the championship crown at their own Acton Invitational Basketball Tournament.

The Redmen copped their league with straight wins early in the week and then topped previously unbeaten J.A. Turner Trojans 26-18 for the tourney title. In first

round play the Acton team had a fight for the first period but broke away for a 45-20 win over Centre Wellington High School (Fergus). In the semi-finals the Redmen played what might be considered their poorest game of the year, nipping Lord Nelson of Burlington 32-27.

In the final it was a battle of what could be the Peel-Halton Junior

Girls' Basketball Champions. Both J.A. Turner and Lord Nelson are undefeated league champions. Turner in Peel. Turner had lost only once before the tourney, that being an exhibition match to the same Acton team.

Walkerton walked off with the consolation trophy for the tournament edging Centre Wellington 34-31 in the

final game. In the tournament's opening contest Acton had little trouble with Wellington. Wellington played it tight in the first period as they counted almost half their points trailing 9-9 after the first. In the second period Acton took total control outscoring their opposition 10-0. The route continued in the third period as Acton added

another 12. The Redmen rounded out their scoring with 14 fourth quarter points. Wellington split 12 points over the second half.

Mardie Phillips led the Acton attack with 10 points in the match while Lori DeBruyn and Linda Osso potted six each.

In their second game of the tourney team coach Lyn McLaren took responsibility for the close score. Acton built up a 22-6 halftime lead but could not maintain it. Acton used a three line system over the first two games and coach McLaren went to the second line in the second half trying to get some 'kinks' out. All season the team has used the three lines but in Saturday's second game the second line was having problems getting on track. "I went back to my second line," says McLaren "hoping they could work themselves out of it." They got themselves in a deeper hole and Acton needed their first line to hold the fort over the final three minutes.

Kelly White and Linda Osso shared the point leadership for Acton with ten points each while Mardie Phillips added four.

In the final match it

was a closely contested affair in which Acton led all the way. Three first period baskets from Linda Osso gave the locals a 6-2 lead at quarter time and the teams exchanged eight points in the second period. In the third period the Acton defence was dominant holding Turner to two points while they ran up the score with eight more points. In the final period neither team could mount an offence as each team hit for four points.

Linda Osso was Acton's leading scorer for the tournament and for the final game. Miss Osso picked up ten points in the final 26 overall placing her third amongst tourney scorers. Deb Simmons of Walkerton was the top point getter on the day amassing 52 points.

In other first round games at the tourney Nelson defeated Erin 28-15. Blakelock destroyed Arthur 42-7, and Turner topped Walkerton 44-13. In semi-final play Centre Wellington subdued Erin 41-21. Walkerton topped Arthur 40-23 behind the 22 point performance of Deb Simmons. Acton edged past Nelson 32-27, and Turner eliminated Blakelock 38-24.

# Redmen record intact as Halton season ends

Acton High School's Junior Girls' basketball team finished their Halton County season last Thursday in style as they iced Milton 58-16 to complete their season with an unblemished seven wins against no defeats. Earlier in the week they disposed of T.A. Blakelock 35-25 to secure first place.

The Acton school, which is outsized (school population wise) by every team they play against, had a remarkable regular season with only Blakelock coming anywhere close to the Redmen on the scoreboard. Every other game of the season the Acton

team more than doubled the score.

Acton started quickly in their match with Blakelock building up an 8-2 first quarter lead but a poor offensive showing in the second period left the locals leading by only one 8-7.

The third period of the match was all Acton as they counted 15 points while allowing Blakelock only three. In the final frame Acton again let up as the visiting team more than doubled their total of the first three-quarters bouncing home 15 points of their own. Acton tallied 12 to take their closest win of the year.

Linda Osso led the

Acton scorers with 13 points with Mardie Phillips counting eight.

The Milton Mustangs proved no contest for their locals in their final preparation for the playoffs. The locals led 18-4 after the first period and 17-7 at halftime. The Redmen counted another ten points in the third period and finished with a 21 point final period. Milton counted nine points in the last half.

Linda Osso, again, paced the Acton attack with 11 points while Dayle Robinson had a big night sinking ten.

Team coaches Anne Lepik and Lyn McLaren commended Kelly White

and Barb Wilson for their court leadership in the Milton contest.

With an undefeated season behind them the Redmen must be favored heading into the first round of play-offs against fourth placed Georgetown. The Rebels finished tied for third with Oakville-Trafalgar but dropped to fourth on a loss to the Oakville school. In an earlier meeting between Acton and Georgetown the Redmen came out 41-20 winners. If they defeat Georgetown this time around the Acton team will head into the Halton semi-finals against the second place finisher of the West Division.
