

Acton's dead remembered in special Sunday service

Acton's war dead were remembered in a special Remembrance Day Service at the cenotaph on the lawn of Trinity United Church Sunday morning.

Several participants from the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 197 of Acton and Lorne Scots "C" Company and an array of others marched along a parade route from the post office to the cenotaph where several wreaths were laid in Remembrance.

The Lorne Scots formed an honor guard while service clubs, schools, fire, police,

women's groups, Legion members, MPP Julian Reed and Mayor Peter Pomeroy laid wreaths.

Legion president John Goy did the Legion charge while John McHugh read of the names of those who gave their lives. Elliott played the 'Last Post' and 'Reveille' which was followed by the benediction by Legion Padre Reverend Charles Beaton.

May ban train whistles

The sound of train whistles may become a thing of the past in Halton Hills, if a request by Halton Hills general committee is agreed to by the Canadian Transport Commission.

Monday night general committee voted to ask the CTC to conduct an investigation, necessary before the train whistles can be stopped.

Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson argued there was more security when the whistles warn of a coming train.

Councillor Roy Booth said the request from J.D. Pemberton, of Chocolea Farms had been made before. "We were led to believe we couldn't do it then be-

cause the township was a rural area, now because we are one town, perhaps it's possible." He said in the 17 sideroad and Maple Avenue area the whistles are blasted twice within seconds. He said in winter when windows are closed and heaters running the whistles aren't heard anyway.

Councillor Ross Knechtel pointed out there should be more opinions from the people in the area. "We've only received one letter."

Assistant Clerk Delmar French explained the CTC would survey people anywhere near the crossings before any recommendations are made.
