

Bonnette scores second shut-out



No one can say Van's Welding's defense was not on the job during their industrial encounter with Lakeview Centre on Sunday. The problem of the matter was not that they weren't there but that they were. Van's goaler Charlie Payne had more help than needed and it cost Van's a 6-0 shut-out at the hands of the Centre men, who pushed their record to four and zero.

Lakeview Centre and Blow Press are destined to make the first meeting of the two clubs a battle for first place in the Acton Industrial Hockey League. Both teams are currently unbeaten in four games but if Rick 'Bunny' Bonnette remains hot, things could be difficult for Blow Press.

Bonnette led the Lakeview team to their fourth straight win on Sunday with his second straight shut-out as he stymied Van's Welding by a 6-0 count. Blow Press had to pull off a third period comeback to keep their unbeaten status as they rallied from a 3-1 deficit to edge a fired up Family Cleaners squad 4-3. In the nightcap Acton Terminal Warehouse stayed clear of the basement, nipping winless Heller's 7-3.
