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Parents help look for site

St. Joseph's School Parents' Association is helping Halton's Separate School Board search for a site for a new school. The parents' association formed a building committee to look for an m-town site for the \$2.5 million school according to association president Vince Wielan. About 40 parents met to help organize the association in St. Joseph's Church Hall, Thursday. Among the other committees formed were: building, fund raising and publicity. A new school for St. Joseph's is the number one priority for the school board, trustee Hartley Sherk has told parents. St. Joseph's School is in the old stone school in front of Robert Little School. "We've set the wheels in motion and we're looking for positive results," Mr. Wielan said. Mr. Wielan described the ideal site as being between four and five acres and not much farther to walk to than the new high school. The separate school board has been searching for some time for the site of sufficient size to take a new building.

CAS receives funding

Halton's Children's Aid Society has been saved from bankruptcy, at least until the end of the year, according to Ron Coupland, executive director of the society, said \$300,000 received from the provincial Ministry of Community and Social Services could pay for the society's operations until the end of the year. A further grant of \$47,000 from the Ministry would pay the salaries of three of four staff members hired last year. The society had been instructed to lay off these workers. "The Board accepted the money with no prejudice," Coupland said. "We're not backing up from our original statement that this is the amount of money we need to provide this service in this area." "Frankly, the board is becoming exhausted by the maneuvering of the Ministry," he added. The financial help extended to the Society followed a period of intense negotiations between the ministry and the other children's aid societies in the area, including Hamilton, Haldimand-Norfolk and Niagara. "We're going to face horrendous budget increases in the future because we are having to place children in facilities outside the region since we don't have the space for them," said Coupland.
