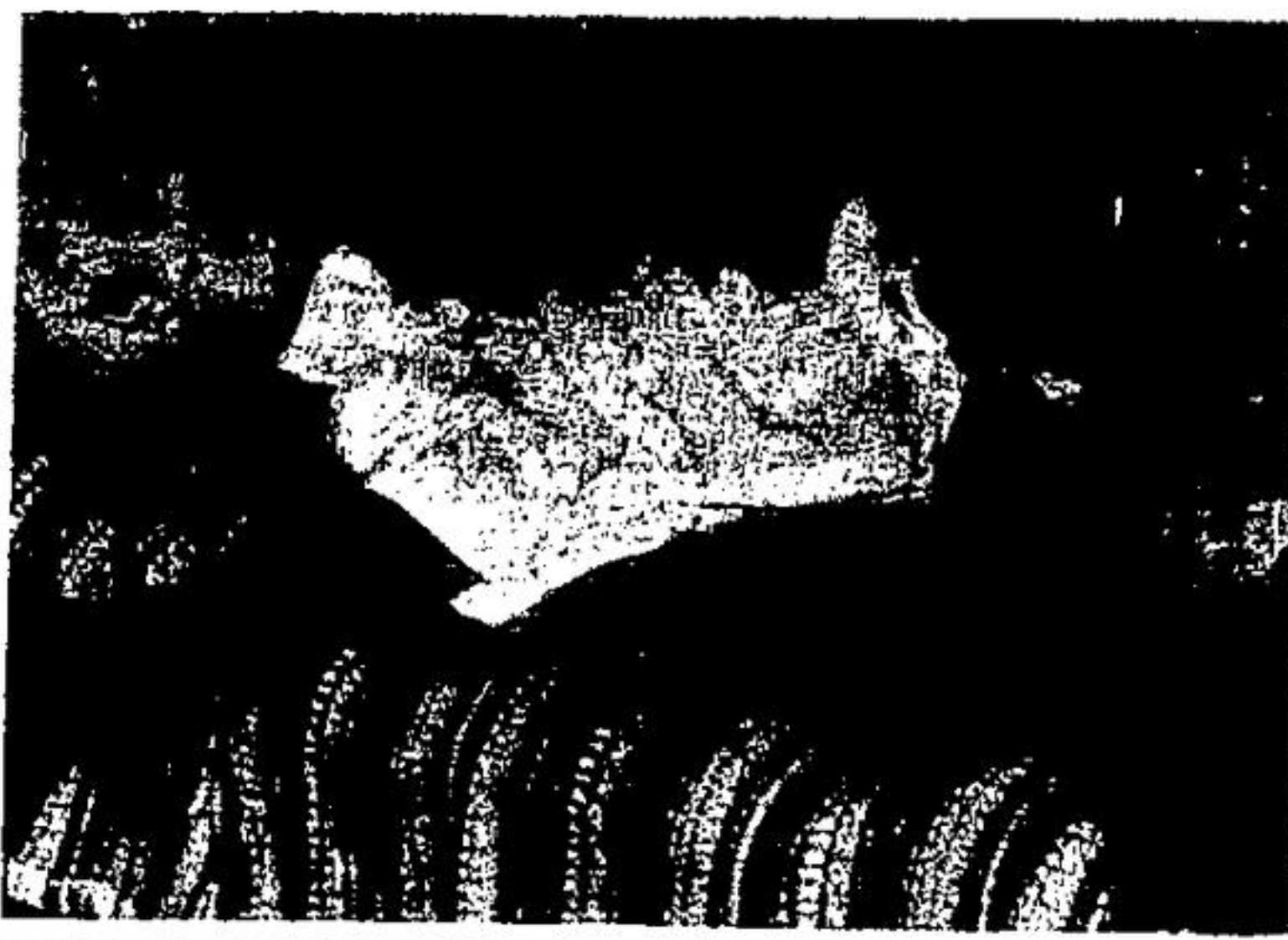

Disaster plan being upgraded

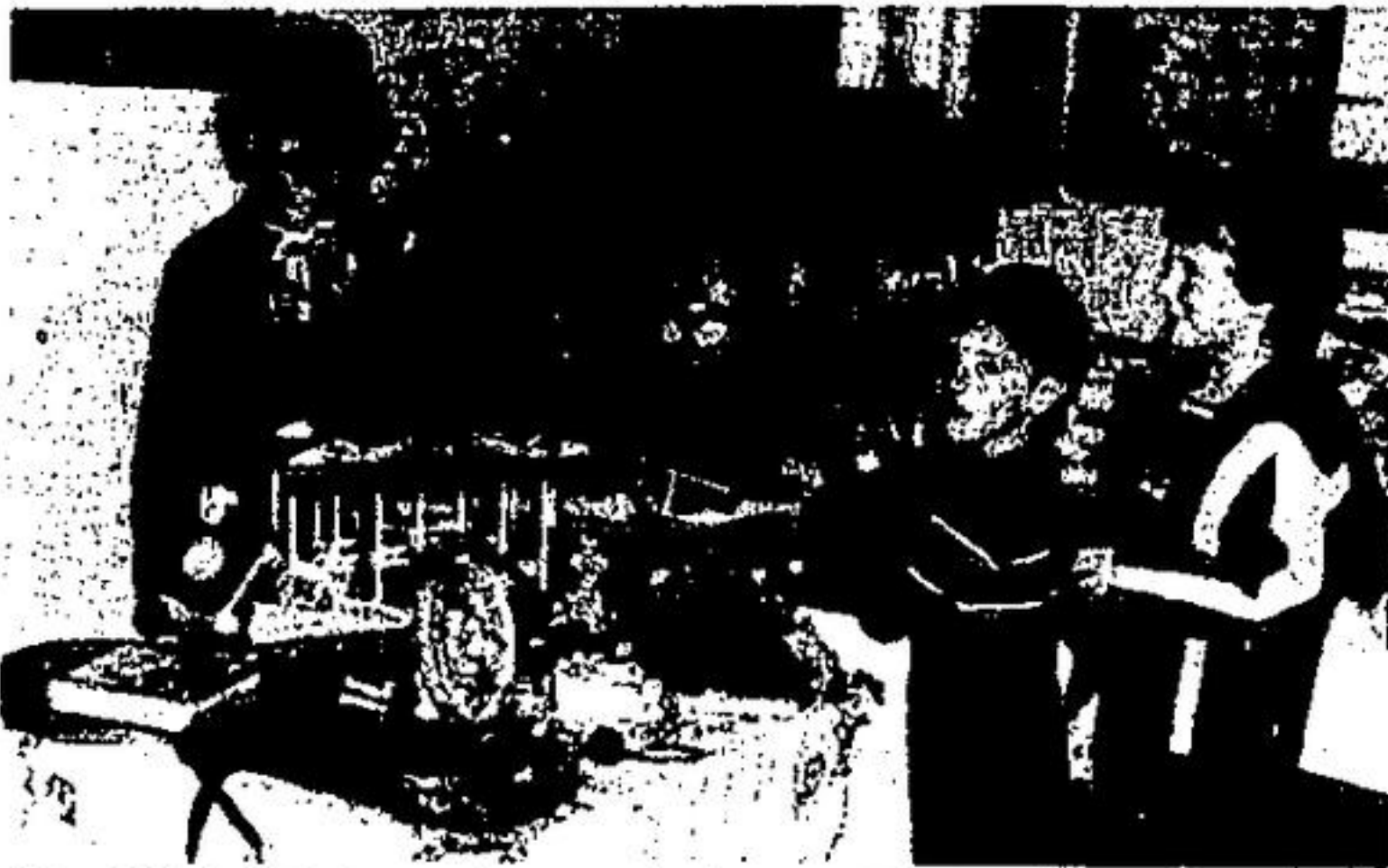
Halton has a disaster plan, but it is going to get a better one.

Regional council was told last week the Mississauga tanker-chlorine disaster has prompted acting Halton chief of police James Harding to call a meeting with the region's five fire chiefs and come up with a new, more comprehensive plan.

Milton Mayor Don Gordon told council By-law 1-78 has been in force for almost two years and it was partially implemented with the evacuation of a number of families on the south-east sector of Oakville when chlorine fumes began to spread southward from the crash scene.

Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett said he had been at the command post scene along with several other Halton representatives and was impressed by the speed and efficiency of the Peel Regional Police in moving people from the danger zone.
