# Congregation bids farewell to Rev., Mrs. McFadden

The Congregation of Churchill Community Church assembled on Sunday Nov. 25 to say farewell to Rev. and Mrs. J.L. McFadden who had been their ministers for the past four years.

The service of worship was conducted by Jim McFadden and Eleanor preached the sermon. Her message, a summing up of the philosophy that guides her own life and that she continually strives to promote, was that a healthy, vital spiritual life is necessary if one is to enjoy physical and emotional well-being.

In order to achieve a healthy spiritual life, one must keep in close and constant contact with the positive and creative energies that control impulses for good in the world—this energy force is God. At the same time one must avoid the neg-

ative, destructive and hateful thoughts and feelings that are so debilitating.

Following the service a pot-luck buffet dinner was enjoyed in the downstairs auditorium. Mrs. Vera Denny read a message, thanking the McFaddens for their pastoral guidance over the past four years, and their contribution to the spiritual life of Churchill. The cheerful and friendly support of the whole family has been appreciated, especially David, who assisted in the singing, and also played violin with the church orchestra.

The pressure of increasing cares and family responsibilities forcing a curtailment of outside commitments will be made lighter by their abiding faith.

In presenting the envelope gift, Clerk-of-Session Smith Griffin added his own thanks and good wishes for the future.

Mrs. Eleanor Thompson, on behalf of the CCCW presented Eleanor McFadden with a china cup and saucer.

Both Eleanor and Jim McFadden spoke in appreciation recalling many memorable occasions of fellowship here. "We will come back for visits if you invite us," Jim concluded, and an invitation was immediately extended to the Christmas Candle-lighting service.

Evidences of Joy's passion for riding are everywhere and hunting pictures line the walls some dating back 200 years or more.

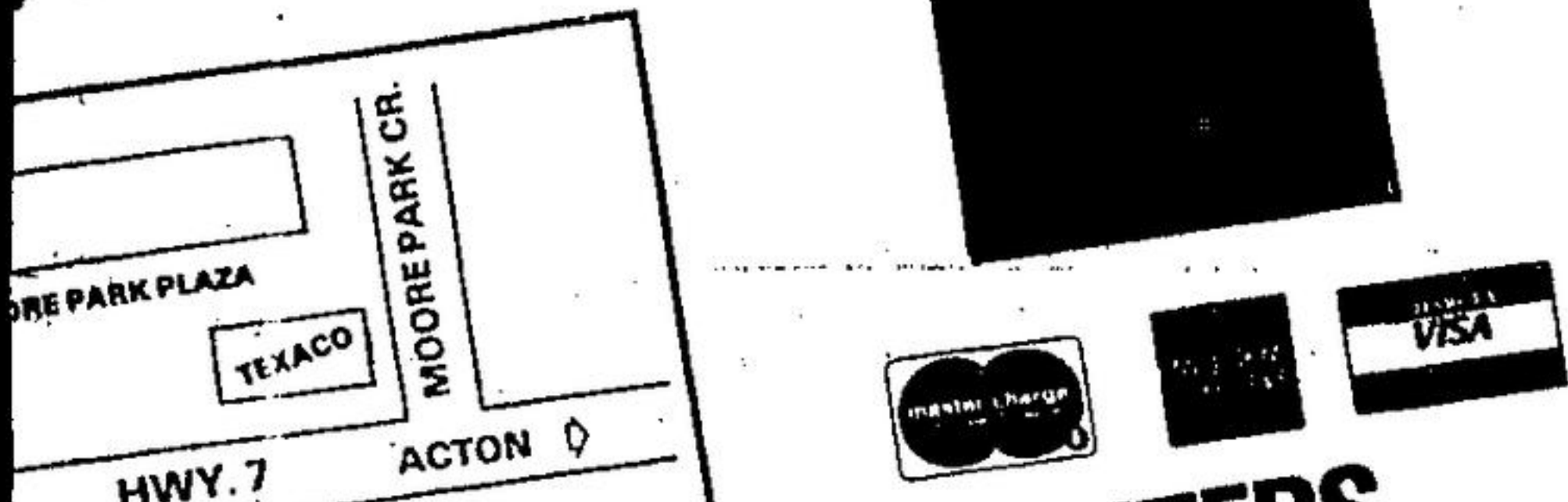

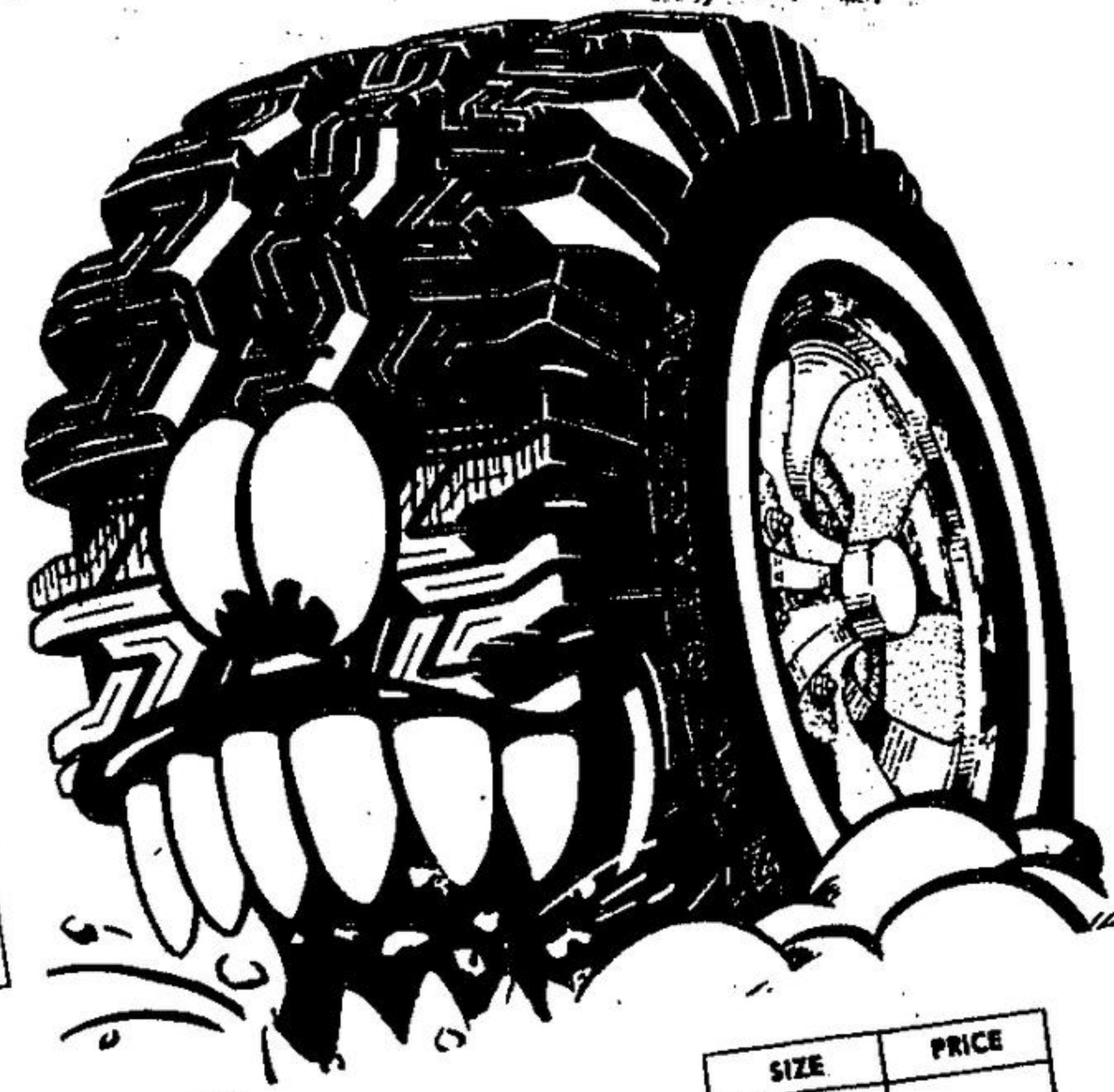

### Percy Kitching well liked

Percy Kitching was one of a family of five boys and three girls, who were born on the family farm, first Concession, Lot 21, Nassagaweya, (now part of the town of Milton.) He was in his 96th year, when he died at Milton Hospital.

Until about two years ago, he was able to help with the farm work. He has one sister surviving, in Red Deer, Alta., at the age of 104. Kitchings acquired the land from the Crown, in the 1830's. He and his devoted wife, Ella Johnston, celebrated their diamond wedding, before she predeceased him in 1972. One child died in infancy. Their son Harold has done much travelling, for Cocksbutts, the Columbo Plan, the United Nations and Massey-Ferguson. At the time of his father's death, he was in South Africa.

Mr. Kitching was a pillar of the church for many years, singing in the choir, in his younger days, and holding various offices, being a trustee at the time of his death. He always worked for the good of the community. His death seems like the end of an era. His grandson John said of Percy, "We were good friends." The three great-grandchildren, Paula, Greg, and Jay are carrying on the family musical tradition.

Rev. Russel Finley conducted the funeral service, with interment in Ebenezer Cemetery. A donation to the Ebenezer Improvement Fund would be a fitting memorial.

"Well done, good and faithful servant."

Speyside is making ripples in radio. Since the Halton Regional Police succeeded in erecting its radio transmitter behind Speyside school, the police commission has been pestered by other agencies wanting to make Speyside the centre of their communications.

First the Mounties got permission to put in a transmitter and more recently the region's public works department is pressing its suit for a twig on the transmitter tree.

While entertaining the works department's request, Halton police commissioners last Thursday at Oakville learned from fellow commissioner, Glenn Magnuson, of Georgetown, that Milton's Hydro Electric Commission and the new Halton Hills Hydro Electric Commission are expected to ask for space on the police transmission tower.

All the applications will be considered and checked with the Ontario Police Commission's technical branch to ensure no transmitter interferes with another.
